When you consider that if Maggie was just a few inches further out into the intersection she would have been T-Boned in the drivers side, or if the opposing lane of traffic had other vehicles in it (remember this is rush hour on Jefferson), the other car could have easily caused further damage or physical injury. It was a sobering reminder that all of our activities, things, possessions, cars, homes, whatever, can be taken away from us in a heartbeat if we're not diligent and drive defensively.

Let's be careful out there this summer. Remember we don't call them Little British Cars for nothing, they are tiny little buggers compared to some of the newer cars and trucks. Let's have a safe and uneventful driving season this year so we can gather at the Christmas Party and celebrate another fun driving season. And while you're at it, hug your family a little tighter, love a little stronger, and be a little kinder to one another. We, the collective membership is what makes the club. The cars just bring us together and can be replaced if need be. We as individuals however, cannot.





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

AUTO PHILOSOPHY 101

From Spokes April 1989

This article will try to explain my thoughts about my MG's, besides saying "I know my what I like." I might as well outline my priorities for my MG's; basically, they have always been:

- 1. <u>Drive it!</u> You must drive it enough so it isn't a strange car to you, thus you feel comfortable with it. You should enjoy some good, twisty roads with it regularly.
- 2. <u>Maintain it</u>- This, to me, means keep it from going downhill. I try to do all levels of repair myself, as much as reasonably possible. This must be a variable, depending on your experience, ambition, budget, and the condition of the car. (In the case of my '75 B, it couldn't have gone much farther downhill mechanically!)
- 3. Rebuild it to your own standards in your own time. My personal goal is not to have a 'Show Car', just a presentable one For reference, reupholstery is pretty easy; bodywork and painting start lo get more difficult and time-consuming. However, removing and re-installing lights, bumpers, interior & exterior items & trim could save you a bundle when getting your car repainted. A lot of engine work must be sent out to an engine shop, but a lot of the disassembly and reassembly can be handled by many owners.

I suppose some people may wonder why anyone would want three driveable MG's, when two were more than enough. A valid question, though, and I have asked it myself. Rationalization includes:

- 1. MGA Roadster for those perfect top-down days (not too hot), summer evenings, parades, and for being 'different'. Let's face it: the car attracts a lot of attention, even from little kids who holler "Nice Car" without having the vaguest idea of what it is or how old.
- 2. <u>MGB-GT</u> for spring and fall touring and mini-vacations within, say, New York State. I'd be confident enough to drive any of my three MG's on a week's vacation, but cargo space is a slight consideration when you add up clothes, coats, food, tools, and parts. Well, also, my GT is a little noisier than my Chevy.
- 3. '75 MGB for driving to work 8 months of the year. I have gotten a hardtop for it to keep warmer and drier than with the soft, top. Note that my chronicles also state that I feel the full-time soft top is real neat for June, July, and August, PERIOD.

And I also suppose that some people may ask "Aren't your MGA and MGB very similar?" Well, yes.. But no!


The design and specifications are indeed similar, and the MGB is a further development from the MGA. But

each has its own "character" which I find fascinating. For instance:

- 1. How does an MGA with no anti-sway bar compare to an MGB-GT with one? Very well, thank you! I feel the roadholding and predictable handling are surprisingly close. They both have just enough "understeer" to keep me out of trouble. (The lack of screaming raw horsepower also helps in this.)
- 2. How does a later model MGB with a pollution-controlled engine perform? Thanks to my friend Jim Latacki and his beautiful '80 B, I can tell you there is a lot of power for midrange acceleration! I was amazed and very pleased to discover this; maybe I am a little too used to driving my family saloon, my '74 Austin Marina (which is
- in retirement). Anyhow, the '80 B may even scoot better than my '73 B-GT in that range. .stay tuned...
- 3. What happens to an MGB when you raise the ride height, cut costs by not installing an anti-sway bar, and add still more weight in the rubber bumpers? well, let me assure you, the handling is indeed as bad as you would predict.

Each ear, with each set of variables, is always a little different, however, and this is a great interest of mine. The MGA with its 15" wheels, large steering wheel, and low center of gravity, is an interesting contrast to the MGB with 14" wheels, a little more power, but something a little more weight. Well, this could lead to the end of this article, by way of a long ride in the hills...for research purposes, naturally. But on any account, I'll wrap it up for now. Hopefully, I'll get around to articles for the Spokes on each of my ears in the near future.


Thoroughly modern MG

It's a tease to be sure, but this concept-car MG, put together by the Austin Rover Group in England, could become a production car in the 1990s. The EX-E couldn't be farther from the flapping side curtain MGs that came out of the Morris Garages. The MG could now stand for modular and glued up. Three main modules go together with the high-strength, aluminum-alloy frame: one carries the rear engine and suspension, another the passenger compartment and the third the front suspension steering and final drive systems. Adhesive bonding of the plastic skin panels completes final assembly.

The test-bed vehicle is powered by Austin Rover's 3-liter V6, a 4-valve-per-cylinder aluminum unit tuned for 250 hp. The engine and 4wd components were developed for the Group B MG Metro 6R4 rally car. The slippery body has a drag co-efficient of 0.24 and the roof is the canopy-type most often seen on jet fighter aircraft. Inside, a credit-card- type key is for locks and ignition, rain sensors in the windshield activate the wipers, and other instrumentation and ,displays-like navigational aids-take full advantage of the central computer. This car wants to take you into the future. Are you ready?

Show draws 10,000 spectators

VICTOR - The 18th annual Sports and Vintage Auto Show drew an estimated 10,000 spectators to the campus of the Victor Central Schools Sunday.

Desi Benet, chairwoman for the event, said 854 cars were entered in this year's show.

"The weather seemed to make some impact," she said, referring to windy and overcast conditions Sunday morning. "(The number of entrants) was down from last year - although not tremendously.

" Ms. Benet said about 930 cars were entered in last year's auto show. "

A lot of people came later in the day, when it got nicer out" she said. "They came with the sun."

Ms. Benet said Sunday's event ran "very smoothly," with no cars experiencing mechanical problems or "getting stuck in the mud - a problem we've had in the past."

She said entrants came from as far away as Canada to the north, Syracuse to the east, Pennsylvania to the south and Buffalo to the west. The auto show is sponsored by the MG Car Club of Rochester and the Victor Lions Club. Funds raised by the event are targeted for various charities.

Among local winners in the various categories was Canandaigua/resident Edward Winter III. His 1979 Chevy Shortbox Silverado was named best of class in the Custom Radical category.

Founder and former chairman of the auto show, David Wild, said well-known artist and craftsman Wendell Castle - who lives in Monroe County – won two first place trophies in separate MG categories.

Ms. Benet said, weather notwithstanding, the show seems to draw larger crowds annually.

"It's just grown every year," she said. "They say baseball is America's national pastime, but I'm not so sure. This has gotten pretty popular."
