



One no vote is sufficient to deny a person the Brudno Award. None of the previous recipients have any idea of how anyone else votes so there is no arm twisting or "campaigning" by any Brudno Member. So now that you have a little history of the award, let's get to this years recipient.

Our honoree this year was Wally Roworth. It gave me a great deal of pleasure to present this award to Wally as we have been friends for many years and his recognition was well deserved.

Wally joined the MG Car Club in 1986 and has been a loyal and <u>active</u> member since. He has had a total involvement in the club, doing whatever is necessary, to help the club succeed in all its activities. He is always at meetings and events which proves how strongly he feels about the club and its functions.

He has held the position of Secretary from 1991 through 1995. (which amounted to a double term). And also writes a monthly column "**Ten Years Ago**" for Spokes, and has been a regular advertiser for many years. He is also a distributor for Moss Motors and has helped anyone and everyone with their parts orders if asked to do so.

He has served as chairman of the Car Corral at our car shows from 1994 to the present time. The Car Corral has grown very large and this past year it was the largest corral ever. 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# SENECA LODGE ROOMS



"Well, we could be in trouble." I came in from the garage, stamping my feet as I came to shake the snow off the heavy Winter boots I was wearing. Eileen rolled her eyes in that knowing way and smiled a wan smile.

It had begun in the most curious way. A little wet snow late on a Friday had caused me to decide to touch up the driveway that night just to be sure the buildup was kept to a minimum. I'd "saddled up" into Winter work jacket, gloves and boots and headed out to the plow truck shelter. About 20 deep pumps on the accelerator to prime the 20 plus year old carbureted engine on the plow truck and a couple of false starts later I had the old beast at least running and holding RPM. Time has not been good to this truck, and the automatic choke is just another entry in the increasing list of victims. It takes a goodly amount of pumping on the accelerator to keep it running when it first comes up, but after a few minutes it settles down and behaves itself as I expect it to.

I raised the blade and checked the side to side swing. Yup – the hydraulics were "all good." Shoving the transmission shifter into first and making sure the transfer case was in Low range, I popped the engine turns up to about 1800 RPM, rapped it a couple of times and brought the clutch out. With a lurch we were underway. I dropped the blade and we began the first pass, which takes me out to the road in just about any side to side orientation in the driveway that keeps me moving. The goal of the first pass is to open up a lane I can widen in successive passes. The first pass is usually the most exciting.

Arriving at the road with a load on the blade, I eased to a stop, raised the blade and backed off a bit. Charging the pile I'd just left at the end of the drive, I blew through it and put the truck into a tight right hand turn. Backing, I lined up on the pile and got set for a quick shove to put the pile on the shoulder just past the end of the drive. Suddenly I had the strangest sensation that I was looking down a steeply inclined hood which used to be pretty flat. "OK, this is strange," I observed. A quick look behind me revealed that I was also looking down a hill over the bed.

At times like this I like to take stock of the situation. First of all, it was dark. I still had lights on the truck, the engine was still running, the brakes still worked and I could still get the blade off the ground. Fair enough. Shoving the pile onto the shoulder and more than likely adding some stone to the yard that would need to be picked up in the Spring, I turned as I backed and lined up for the second pass. It was getting late, and whatever

.had happened wasn't going to fix itself at that hour. Goal one was to clean up the drive if I could and get back inside for dinner

Finishing up the series of runs and pirouettes required to dig us out after a snow, I pulled the truck into the shelter nose first, on the theory that I might have better light in the morning to see what had happened if I had the back end out. I was sort of musing to myself that maybe the bolts holding the bed on the frame had failed. I carry a fair amount of "ballast" in the absolute rear of the bed, since experience has shown that it's not a question of power to the wheels as much as it is a question of ensuring the wheels can transfer that power to the ground. Traction is the number one problem I run into when digging out.

Overnight I woke up early and my brain "slipped into gear." It must be the bed securing bolts, I mused to myself inaudibly, since I'd done a hammer test on the truck frame early in the Fall and had convinced myself that the frame was solid enough for another year. Still, only a real look would tell for sure. After we'd done the obligatory Saturday morning grocery list I'd headed out to check out what had really happened to the truck while Eileen made herself ready for another weekend day of Hunting and Gathering.

It didn't take long to find the problem. Just ahead of the forward spring shackle for the rear axle's leaf springs, the frame had failed spectacularly on both sides. As a result, the frame rails looked more like mountains than railroad tracks when viewed from the side. Thus my observation to Eileen, and her knowing roll of the eyes. It was early January, and we had a long ways to go until Spring. We were now in a race to see which came first: Spring, or Death of a Plow Truck

.One of my "defining character attributes" is that I hate to lose. On the other hand, I wasn't even sure what I could do at this point to not lose. After Eileen left to run the Saturday errands I stood behind the truck and contemplated my options. Step one might be to shift the ballast behind the wheel boxes to the front of the bed and see what happened next. So I did that around 10:00AM or so. By noon the frame rails were much straighter, and although there was still a visible "hog" to the frame we at least had something that looked more like a truck than a clown car. With the truck in this shape I was able to do another touch up later that day to compensate for some lake effect flurries moving through the area. So far so good. By the end of that session we had a little sag in the

frame, with the cab gently leaning on the front of the box for support, so I shifted some of the ballast aft a bit. Wondering how long I could get away with this, I left the truck like that for a week or two, using it as the demand arose.

The answer was "not long." Arriving at the end of a run on another snowy day, I recognized that we were now carrying a little hog in the frame. I piled out of the cab and fooled around with the ballast again. At the end of the next pass, we had a little sag again, which I patently ignored. At the end of the next pass, we had a little hog. Uh oh. We were now doing what I used to do as a child when I wanted to break off something metallic and lacked the proper tools. It was getting harder to project a positive end to this scenario.

The next step was to do a couple of things. I called the guy I've been buying used trucks from in Ontario and asked to keep an eye out for a likely candidate at the auctions he regularly attends. I'd also been fooling around with buying a tractor for the place, with the stated objective of increasing the mower deck width and also increasing my potential speed over the ground when mowing. I'd been planning for a Spring delivery, but I accelerated the delivery date. Mostly, as I casually mentioned to someone, to be sure I could pull both pieces in from the road if the plow truck actually broke in two.

By now I was pretty convinced that I couldn't just try and skate through the plowing season without doing something else. The key question was "what?" The frame rails at this point had a lot of metal missing in a triangular pattern just ahead of the front spring shackles. There were a number of interesting projections off the frame for bed and cab mounts which would make just slapping a piece of 1/8th inch steel plate on the side of the rails a trifle challenging. Plus, what guarantee did I have that I'd even find anything near the break solid enough to weld through?

An old friend of mine happened to be in town while I was musing about this out loud, and happened to suggest using a piece of channel. Of course. I could weld some lever arms down the vertical height of the frame ahead and behind of the break, and then weld in a length of channel to tie the arms together and it might be good enough to get us through to Spring.

A stop at a Home Depot on the way home one night produced two lengths of "weld steel" 1½ inch channel. A little lighter than I might have wanted, but then this wasn't going to be a permanent repair. This was going to be "damage control," enough of a repair to get us to Spring and not much more.

The next Saturday the prediction was that we would see significant snow by Sunday morning. Friday night I backed the old truck into the shop. The next morning I lit off the diesel and slapped the heaters on the generator to start trying to get some warmth in the shop. First of all, I put a jack and a wooden block or two under a cross member on the frame and jacked the frame back into relative straightness. From each length of channel I cut two 9 inch arms and placed them vertically on the frame. With the arms welded in place, I used the rest of the channel to span between the arms. I put the channel low enough that I could get the welder in to lay bead at every side of the joints for extra strength.

As I backed off on the jack, the gap between the bed and the cab didn't change appreciably. Flakes had begun falling as I'd started cutting the first piece of channel, and by this time there were two or three inches on the ground. I went out and did a plow run, and by the end of the run the gap still hadn't changed appreciably. I put the truck in the shelter, nose out this time, and called it quits for the day.

Clearly, we're due for a new plow truck. The "White Fright," or the Phoenix Acres All Purpose Farm / Plow / Utility Truck has seen it's next to last trip off the property. First of all, it has clearly passed its last State Inspection. More importantly, with all the flexing we've done on fuel and brake lines I have no reason to think that they're particularly solid at this point, either. However, it is a whole lot more rigid than it was, and although I am seeing a little sagging, the cab still isn't leaning on the bed for support and at least the leading indicators would suggest we could make it to Spring.

No, I haven't done much else to the B, other than I did move the transmission from one shop that wasn't making any progress to another shop which is also not making any progress. That, however, is a tale for a different telling.

I do hate to lose.....

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


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
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
