



Valve Cover Racing Official Rules

Brooks Schneider

The Cars:

- The cars shall have no power source. All motive force is provided by gravity.
- Cars shall be based on actual rocker cover or cam cover from an MG or British made automobile engine.
- Wheelbase shall be no more than 24 inches. Note: The staging lane is only 24 inches long.
- Wheel track shall be no more than 14 inches.
- Cars must have 4 wheels, each no more than 6 inches in diameter.
- Cars shall weigh 12 pounds or less.
- Car design should allow the front wheels to touch a 2 inch high starting gate.
- Any car changed during the races is subject to inspection.


The Course:

- The course shall consist of a launch incline 8 feet long, followed by a level run of 20 feet.
- Two lanes shall divide the launch incline, each 2 feet wide. The incline shall be 2 feet high at the rear-most part and level with the course at the front edge. The front edge shall be mitered to provide a smooth transition from the incline to the run-out area.
- The official "Starting Line" shall be 2 feet from the rear edge of the incline. A mechanized starting gate, which is 2 inches high, shall be provided.
- The run-out section of the course shall consist of 2 lanes, each 3 feet wide. The lanes shall be clearly marked.
- The finish line shall be marked 20 feet from the front edge of the launch incline.

The Races:

- Cars will run in heats of 2 cars each.
- The cars are to be launched with their front wheels on the starting line. If your car design does not allow for this, it is at a disadvantage. The first car to have its front wheels cross the finish line is the winner. If neither car reaches the finish line, the car going further within its lane wins.
- If the wheels of a car should touch a lane marker, or cross over a lane marker, the car shall be disqualified. The competing car immediately becomes the winner.
- The winner of the round is the first car to win 2 races.
- Lanes are alternated between races.
- Winning cars will advance to the next round until all are eliminated but 1 car. Scoring is double-elimination to the finals.
- The 1st-place car is the one that is undefeated through all rounds.
- The 2nd-place car is the one that is defeated in only the final round.
- The 3rd-place car is the one that is defeated once prior to the final round, but wins all subsequent rounds.



MG (S)Miles and a Sad Farewell Part LXVII (67)

These are the MG (S) Miles that I wish I didn't have to write but they need to be done. Last weekend the MG Community and the MG Car Club lost another loyal member and extremely good friend when Denver Cornett passed away in Kentucky. Denver had been ailing for about two years and finally could no longer fight the battle. I know some of you knew Denver and to those who didn't you missed a marvelous opportunity of knowing one of the finest gentlemen I have ever had the privilege of meeting.

Denver was regularly at Watkins Glen, racing his TC just as he did in September of 1948 at the first race ever at the "Glen". The story of that race is "old hat" to some of you but to those who are not familiar with it. It goes something like this. Denver bought his TC new in 1947 from a dealer in Florida, because there were no MG dealers in Kentucky. He heard about the planned races at Watkins Glen in 1948 and decided that this was something he had to try. He brought that TC to the "Glen" and entered it to race there. On the first lap of the Queen Catherine Cup Race (the first preliminary race of the day) he came through the Old Stone Bridge corner and got a bit wide and lost control on the gravel and flipped the car over. It rolled 2 ½ time ending up upside down in a dry creek bed. Spectators there wondered aloud "if the driver was alive" and according to Denver, his reply from under the car was "why don't you roll the car over and you'll find out". They got the car up righted and Denver got it back to the pits. With a wheel borrowed from Briggs Cunningham and his spare wheel was able to get the car ready for the final race of the day. Starting from last position, not only did he run in that race but finished a respectable 7th overall. (The Old

Stone Bridge has since been renamed Cornett's Stone Bridge.) The bug had bitten him and he never lost that love for racing his TC and for Watkins Glen.



I first met Denver in 1996 and was impressed immediately with his warmth and great sense of humor. I was also very impressed with this car and shot some photos of it for a possible drawing. I did that drawing over the winter of that year and presented Denver with a copy of it in 1997. He was thrilled with it and couldn't thank me enough for doing it. He also commented that I had included the small cross that he had painted under the race number 7 on the side of the car. I told him I strived for accuracy and without that it wouldn't be a true representation of the car. I had some limited edition prints made and Denver had promised to sign some for me. The following year in 1998 I took the prints to the Glen on Thursday of race weekend and Denver was true to his word and did sign the prints. They were signed in his trailer (raining hard outside) while he used the hood of his car as a desk to do that signing. I continued to see him at Watkins Glen every year up through 2003 which I think was the last year he was able to attend. In 2004 his son Denny told me his dad wasn't feeling up to coming up that year. When he also missed 2005 and 2006 and I knew something serious was wrong. I got the message from Dick Powers that he had passed on

Sunday November 19th at the age of 80.

I was very fortunate in getting to ride with Denver in that car around the original course a number of times and it was a thrill I will never forget. He handled the car beautifully and I think he was back in 1948 every time he went around that course. He took great joy in pointing out the Stone Bridge and loved to comment, "let's see if we can keep it right side up this time", as he flew around that corner. He always did though, and I loved his admonishment to other drivers. "If you're going to roll a car over always make sure there is an even number of rolls. That way you'll always end right side up". OK Denver, if you say so. But I'm not about to find out if that's true

One morning at Seneca Lodge as we were having breakfast he reached in his wallet and pulled out a business card and asked me if it was alright to use them. He had used my drawing along with the number 7 and his name and address for that card. Naturally I told him I was flattered to have him use it.



He was warm and friendly and always remembered his friends. He surprised my grandson the year after I introduced them by remembering his name and asking him how he was. He was that kind of a person.

In doing some research for this article I came across this piece by the writer Mike Davis:

"Suddenly I had a flash of a long forgotten memory. "Denny Cornett?" I asked Glenda. "Yes, he's the nicest

man. He comes up every year for the Race Reenactment." "From Louisville?" "Yes he has a farm in Kentucky". "A little guy wearing glasses?" "That's right. He's famous for what happened at the Stone Bridge in 1948". I had this picture in my mind: this slight fellow driving a windshield-down MG TC, the only one in Louisville, to our Kentucky National Guard meetings at Bowman field. I was a senior in high school. He was older and driving that car created a vast gap between the ordinary and the exotic in the eyes of teenaged boys. People who drove imported sports cars then were a class apart, cut from the cloth of thoroughbred horse owners, polo players, characters from glamorous 1930's movies, like the Great Gatsby. In a way, these "playboys" were living anachronisms, survivors of a way of


life that no longer existed. Oddly, I've no recollection of knowing then that Cornett already was a motorsports hero. The middle class guys I hung around with knew nothing about Grand Prix races in little roadsters someplace in upstate New York.

So here was this spare, bespectacled guy from my National Guard unit, Denny Cornett and we never know he was a genuine motorsports hero. All we know was that he was a "rich guy" and drove the only right had drive, wire wheeled roadster we'd ever seen.

Denver will be sorely missed by all who knew him and it will be along time before we find another to compare with his warmth and friendliness. He phoned me one time and Nancy answered the phone and told him I was out. They had a great and long conversation and Nancy said she felt she had known him for a long time. He was that kind of a person. You could not help but like Denver. We also had the opportunity to meet his wife Sheri at the presentation at the Motor Racing Research facility at the "Glen" and found her to be just as warm and friendly as Denver. They must have made a great team.

His son Denny (Denver III) did say that the car is going to stay in the family and will eventually be given to his son Denver Cornett the IV. That will be some time though as young Denny is only 5 now. Denver is survived by his wife Sheri, and sons Denver III and Christopher.

I'm sure we all extend our heartfelt sympathy to the entire Cornett Family at this most difficult time. ◀



Remembering A Friend

It's still hard for me to believe that my friend and member of our Western New York Centre, Denver Cornett, has passed away. Denver was one of those people I felt would just go on forever. He had great vitality, was still very competitive on the track, fun to hang out with and a real friend. I hope you had a chance to meet him at the Vintage Races at the Glen. If you did, you know why I feel the way I do.

In 1948, a then 22 year old Denver Cornett, was on the starting grid of the first post WWII road race in the US at Watkins Glen. Denver was there in his new #7 MG TC. It was #7 because Denver had the 7th competition license issued by SCCA. He raced his TC till 1955, during the beginning of the Golden Age of sports car racing in America. At that time, most race cars were driven to the track, raced and then driven home. This was the era when the cars on the track were very close to the cars on the road and when racing success depended more on the seat of your pants than the power under your foot. Denver was a great driver and after 1955 moved on to other cars including Porsches.

Besides being in the first US post WWII road race,

Denver was the first dealer of imported cars in Kentucky at Cornett International Motors. He was also a founding member of the Kentucky Region of SCCA and a life member of SCCA too.

But possibly the "1st" he's most famous for is being the first person to roll a car in modern US road racing. During that first race at the Glen, Denver rolled his TC at Stone Bridge. He was fond of telling the story about going off at Stone Bridge and the crowd that gathered around his overturned TC that said: "I wonder if the driver's dead?" To that Denver shouted out: "If you turn the damn thing over you might find out!"

Feisty then and even 50 years later. I'll never forget the time at the 1998 SVRA driver's banquet when Suzie Keppeler wanted to get Denver's autograph on a special Glen 50th Anniversary poster the MG Vintage Racers had made. She asked me to go in the Glen Club with her to ask Denver. When we entered, Bobby Rahal (two time Indy 500 winner and former F1 driver) was speaking to an audience of about 200. We spotted Denver and he came over and happily signed Suzie's poster. He told her she should get Otto Linton's autograph too. During the poster signing, Denver was commenting about his racing and rolling the

TC at Stone Bridge. Evidently we were speaking a little too loudly for someone and so we moved to the back of the room to finish our conversation. Well, Denver must have been in very good voice while talking to Suzie, because the same guy came back to complain again. We nearly had a fist fight in the Glen Club that night and I'm sure Denver would have decked this younger guy with one punch! Denver was still feisty at 72 and a little flirty too.

I first met Denver and his lovely TC at the Glen in 1994. It was at the wonderful MGVR 40th Anniversary Collier Cup event successfully organized by our own Joe Tierno.

That was Denver's first time back to the Glen with his TC since his races in 1948 & 1949 and my first time vintage racing my MGA at the Glen. Becoming friends with Denver and his son Denny was another one of those real blessing in my life, one that would repeat itself in an interesting way 10 years later.

In March of this year, it was my honor to help organize part of the Denver Cornett Tribute held at the IMRRC in Watkins Glen. I was fortunate to have Jim Carson, Jack Archibald and Frank Mount speak on what it was like driving and racing a TC back in the "good old days". Unfortunately Denver couldn't be with us due to his failing health, but

many of our WNYMGCC members were there along with Denver's TC, his lovely wife Sherry and son Denny. This was a wonderful event that truly honored Denver's 58 years in racing.

The last time I saw Denver was in 2004 at the Glen. We had two Collier Cup races that year since 150 racing MG came for the 50th Anniversary of the Collier Cup for MG's.

During the Collier Cup awards presentations in victory circle, Denver turned to me and with a smile on his face and in his voice said: "Dick, you better go up there because you won the Collier Cup!" Denver just had to tell me before it was announced.

I'll sure miss him as will his friends here and around the world. His spirit though, will be with us forever.

Denver is survived by Sherry, his loving wife or 51 years, and his two sons Denver Cornett III and Christopher Cornett.

The MG Car Club Scholarships

Currently we sponsor two scholarships which support students at the Monroe Community College.

The first, which is funded yearly, was established in 1993 to honor the memory of Robert R. Philip. In November of 2002, George Hershell provided me with the following description:

"When Bob passed away 10 years ago, the membership was very distraught that nothing was ever done to recognize his contribution to the club while he was alive. It was decided (during Ted Hershey's tenure as Chairman) to begin the Philip Scholarship at MCC and that it should be awarded to a student in the Auto Tech Division. We worked directly with Tom Fitch who at the time was director of that division. Nothing was written and it was just an agreement between the club and MCC. I made the plaque that hangs in MCC and included 10 plates, to be engraved each year, with the current recipient's name. It was decided that after 10 years we would re-evaluate the Scholarship and the club would decide what to do about it for the future.

The scholarship was for \$600.00 per award. After a number of years the club voted to increase the award to \$1,200 per year

The school selected a person they felt deserved to get the scholarship and that person along with either Tom or Les attended an MGCC meeting where the check was presented to MCC for that persons use. . . . Eventually it got difficult to find someone in the Auto Tech division so we amended our original idea to include someone in the Machine Shop division, as Bob Phillip was an excellent machinist.

Later, Tom Fitch moved to another division and Les Smith took over. . . . "

Late in 2001 it came to our attention that MCC had been funding the Philips Scholarship from their general scholarship fund for two years. The money we sent had been placed in a Philips Scholarship account where it had earned interest. In January of 2002, the board decided that it was not proper for the club to have that money distributed as if it was ours, since to do so would not be the result of our generosity, but rather, we would look good because of a mistake made by MCC. We wanted to distribute the money to the students expediently, meet our responsibility to MCC and uphold the spirit of the Philip Scholarship. In 2006 our plan to use the money in the account, plus any required additional money to fund

our original promise of 10 years of scholarships should be completed.

Later in 2002 we realized that scholarships had not been awarded that year. An investigation showed that both Les Smith and Tom Fitch believed there was a stipulation on the scholarship that restricted the award to students in the evening part-time program. Reflecting the fact that the award was open to all students the Criteria of the Scholarship was amended to expand eligibility to day or evening students.

Many of you know that I teach at RIT and every year I watch students struggle to meet the cost of college. In 2000 I moved into that phase of life where I could expect people I cared about to pass away. Further, the club had little money and there were discussions as to whether even one of the Philips Scholarships could be funded that year. At a monthly meeting I suggested the creation of an endowed scholarship in order to alleviate the problem of identifying targets for our charitable gifts, the dependency of fostering knowledge of the Marque on our yearly income, and the need for a place which we could use to commemorate the accomplishments and contributions of every club member. The scholarship profile below was developed by the board and approved as a scholarship separate from the Philips Scholarship by the membership at a meeting.

Perhaps most important to the discussion at the July meeting, the donor to the Endowment is listed as:

- •MG Car Club Western New York Centre, Inc.
- •Individual club members may donate or may choose to leave a bequest.

The board has added to the fund every year since its establishment. Vice-Chair, Scott Perry suggested a plaque, which Paul Heaney made, be created to recgonize individual donors. He also suggested that the money raised from events including the March Steak Roast and Auction go to the fund. Further, he created a number of events like the April basket auction, and a post Fall Tour bake sale to create ways for the members to have fun and help build the Endowment.

The Endowed Scholarship Fuel Gage, showing our current achievement toward the \$10,000 goal is on page three.
