

We've added a new membership category — Associate Member. Call to order – 7:36 pm

Minutes of last meeting accepted as written and printed in SPOKES.

Regalia – Successful car show with regards to regalia. The new banner was debuted making it easy to find regalia. Nine new members signed up due to slick new brochure. Doug Scribner would like to see the brochure available for members to pass on to potential members. Tonight there is sale on imprinted T-shirts \$6.00 or two for \$10.00

Membership - Jim Priestly reports membership still going, 9 new members from the show and 2 more today (one was a return after 2 year hiatus).

Treasurer - Treasurer is not available to give a report, chairman reports we are in good shape with both accounts. See Joeanna DeBlaere if you have questions.

Librarian - nothing to report

Spokes – Articles and photos are due one week from today. SPOKES could use car show photos, Hildene photos, and HSR photos. A reminder classified ads are free (think Carlisle leftovers), this includes free photo. Also, if the Car Show committee wants to see the winners printed in SPOKES please get the list to Allen H.

Trustee report – nothing to report.

Activities – 150 new member brochures were printed for distribution at the Car Show to see how it worked. It appeared to be a success but your comments are welcome to help in the decision of reprinting. Thanks to Barb Zak, John Baum, Sangsters, and Cheryl Baldwin for distributing the brochures (some while selling T-shirts). Thanks to Doug and Laurie Scribner and Karl Prouty for their part in acquiring the nine new members. Pass on

your comments to the board on the membership brochure.

We will hear recap of car show later tonight, but tonight we held our own impromptu car show on the higher-level parking lot of Burgundy Basin Inn. [See the activities report in SPOKES for a detailed list of future activities.] August 6th is Pig Roast and Rallye starting at 3:00 pm. This late start is because of conflict with RIT Car Show. Joe DeBlaere has agreed to organize a rallye prior to the roast but requested a minimum of 15 participants. Please indicate your interest soon to determine whether or not the rallye will go on. Rhonda and Elaine are opening up a date in June as they feel 5 years has been enough of their "Great Adventures" Garden tours. Car Show report - A lot of people helped on Car Show, location appears to be great spot for show. The Lions Club report Town of Farmington was happy and enjoyed having us there and participant feedback was similar. 500 cars were on field and car corral: at award presentation Dave Wild, Dick Powers, et al were happy with site except spectator parking. Lions Club, with help from high school kids, made sure cars were un-stuck quickly and problems were dealt with quickly; parking area is a farmer's field and has no drainage. Car show could not happen without all the help including those working in the rain. The core team: Arnold VanDenburgh - field layout; Lane Boughton [assisted by Dave Chase] – flea market (lots of prep work done); Pete Pegoni and Wally Roworth - car corral (Wally kept close eye on money); Chief judges - Bob Tescione, George Haynes, Dan Suter, Chris Williams (126 judges organized); George Herschel - artwork and accounting; Gene Dinkel and George Heissenberger - publicity (many articles in Canandaiga Daily Messenger, and other post publications); Mark Gibson - relationship with Harwood Restorations; Joan Heaney - security, Leroy Hokenson was ill [Harriette reports he is better now] but his family stepped up to assist. Gil Langswager - pre-registration (went without a hitch); Betty Lanswager - t-shirts; Abels - brought in the sign; Jim and Dawn Priestly - list keepers, show lists, etc (lists were good and will be refined); Eileen and Chris Williams for party (perfect ending, thanks for hosting). The Wilds, both Dave and Barb for ideas and beginning the show at Wagonjack [and hosting Stuffing Party]. It was a very good year. [Thanks to Leon Zak for website support and Allen Hess for SPOKES edition on car shows]. Please pass on feedback about the show to Dick Powers for discussion at post show meeting.

Old Business – Tonight we have lots of t-shirts left over from car show for any workers that did not pick up already. Also, many dash plaques are available for show workers. Brochures for Watkins Glen show are available.

Chairman brought up an insurance problem. Our policy covers club members only at events, not non-club members. Club history shows we have visitors participating in events, especially the auto rallye. The chairman discussed this with the insurance agent. A suggestion of having another member option – participation membership, for defined time with minimal cost (such as \$5.00) to cover an event. on the day of auto cross participants can join the club for a year or as participant member. This would have to be voted on by members and then our insurance would cover everyone at an event.

Discussion on the topic was held. A suggestion made to consider joining NAMGAR or similar group with benefit of insurance coverage at no cost to us. Questions raised were cost, membership information required, riskmanagement, loss of club distinction, and coverage. The club would need to meet certain criteria (minimum number of members be part of NAMGAR). We may want to continue carrying our current coverage. NAMGAR is insured with JC Taylor as is our club. Our club is a Centre and may not benefit from falling under a specific register, would like to see MG Club maintain distinction. It was agreed to form a committee to investigate. Members are Dan Suter, Gary Sandusky, Dick Powers, Gil Langswager, Dave Wild, Tim Henderson. Discussion continued on insurance coverage. What a family membership constitutes within MG Car Club was clarified - family membership is immediate family only. Cost of our current insurance policy is about \$500.00. Most club policies are umbrella policies and would not be primary insurance. A proposed \$5.00 fee for non-members was suggested.

Last year lots of non-members participated and would gladly pay this. SCCA policy was shared, members pay \$20.00 and non-members \$30.00. Suggested a \$5.00 fee was a good deal. At SCCA events non-members sign a waiver and are covered. It had been confirmed with our insurance agent that signing a waiver is not sufficient for our purposes. Various charges for auto cross participants was suggested. The chairman reminded everyone the discussion is for all events, not just auto cross.

Motion made to institute a \$5.00 membership to participate in events good for one month; fee can go towards full membership if desired. This is nonvoting membership.

Further discussion raised questions on membership documentation - how is it handled, requiring dates. Membership dates, contact info, etc would be required on the day of event. Associate member was suggested as name for this membership. Suggest this be a temporary measure until the committee reports back. Discussion continued with various costs and length of time suggested. Currently we do not prorate memberships in practice although our bylaws state it should be. Suggested we consider this may be defended in court, insurance agent did not believe it needed to be written by an attorney.

Board members are covered under current policy. Event coordinators will handle paperwork.

Motion was amended - Institute an associate membership for \$5.00 that extends for length of event and is non-voting. This motion was passed unanimously.

Auto Cross fees are \$10.00 members, \$15.00 non-members plus one-day membership dues of \$5.00. Active membership lists will be provided to event chairs.

New business - V. Zoltner would like to buy a car, preferably a TR6 Tahiti blue in running condition. Former car show t-shirts are available along with show posters.

Cars and parts announced Door prizes awarded.

MG Club cards available to pass out and new membership lists are available. Jim Priestly is acting treasurer tonight for anyone needing reimbursements.

Meeting adjourned at 9:17 pm.



MG (S)Miles, a Scare and a BIG Thank You Part LXV (65)

As I sit here writing this I can only think how fortunate I am to be able to do this again this month. Last week at this time I was still wiping my brow and thanking all things holy that we were still here. BUT I'm getting ahead of the story. Let's take it from the beginning.

Friday June 9th a group of us left Rochester on our way to Hildene in Manchester Vermont for our annual trek to the big car show there. It was a nice day and we traveled with the Langswager's and Carl Prouty and the day was without incident. We even found a new shortcut (?) that was real sports car roads. It also cut a few miles off and avoided going through some small towns along the way. We arrived in Manchester checked into the hotel and waited for Saturday and the show. Saturday reminded us of the day we had at our show only a week before. Rainy and C O L D. It was

the same on Sunday and as a result the show was considerably smaller than the one last year. MG was the featured car and there were some really beautifully done examples but it was sad to see some of them (newer MGB's) loaded on trailers and towed home. Beautiful cars are meant to be enjoyed by driving them, not as mantle pieces. (But that's only my opinion.) We turned in early that night and were up the next morning ready to start our extended trip.

We had decided some time ago to do a trip up through New Hampshire and Vermont following the same route we did on the New England Mountain Adventures. Lloyd and Sue Potter and Jim and Gail Colegrove said they would like to go also so we had a caravan of three

cars making the trip. Monday morning dawned clear and warm and was an ideal day for traveling. We left Manchester and headed out Route 11 to Route 100 up through Vermont. It was (and always is) a beautiful drive and we arrived at Woodstock and then Queechee Gorge just in time for lunch. The day was flawless and after lunch we went through White River Junction and Lebanon NH and picked up Route 4. The following day I had made arrangements to visit an old army buddy in Maine so we left early and drove what seemed like a million miles to get to his house. The map only showed about two inches but in miles it equated to more like 40 miles one way all on two lane country roads. Beautiful scenery but I should have started out earlier as it took longer than I thought. We had a marvelous afternoon with Tony and his wife Janet. (Who by the way is from Scotland and makes the greatest Scottish soup one would ever hope to have) It was good to see this close friend from so long ago and 52 years melted away in an instant and we had a wonderful visit. We left there later in the afternoon as I wanted to get back to the motel before dark. I don't mind country roads if I am familiar with them but I prefer not to be trying to find my way in the dark in strange surroundings. Well daylight or darkness this trip back made me think of the one trip when we came back from Vermont with a group and the "fearless leader" (yours truly) was neither and couldn't find the seat of



his pants with both hands. I made a wrong turn after leaving Tony's and we saw more nice country roads but none familiar. We finally got back on the correct road and when we finally got to Conway (with one eye on the fuel gauge) I pulled in a station and filled up to the tune of 11.2 gallons. That was cutting it pretty thin.

We spent another day in North Conway and left on Thursday for Stowe. Another beautiful day and a beautiful half day drive over to Vermont. Friday morning we left for Lake Placid and again the weather was beautiful. Nice crossing on Lake Champlain and this time we didn't get a free car wash because of rough weather. Arrived in Lake Placid in time for lunch and spent the afternoon sightseeing and shopping. I also have to thank Nancy for putting up with this crazy obsession of mine to drive this car all over. I also marvel at her calmness during this "incident" (don't like the word accident) and support. There was no yelling or screaming or tears although I know she did feel bad that the car got damaged. I also have to thank someone above who was watching out for us that day. We could have rolled over had I not cranked the wheel. It could have been fatal if there been a car coming in the opposite direction. All these things were possible but we were VERY VERY LUCKY and BLESSED or I would not be writing this today.

It was a great trip and it did give us time to pause and think how lucky we are to have such good friends, such a wonderful forgiving little car, and the ability to share this experience with all of our friends.

Things could have been very different.
Thankfully they weren't.
