Minutes of last meeting accepted as written and printed in SPOKES.

Old Business-

A vote was taken on the proposed changes to the MGCC By-Laws as presented at the last meeting and printed in SPOKES. Both proposals were unanimously approved and the following changes to the MGCC By-Laws will be made:

- Article II number 1 of the MGCC by-laws for clarification and continuity. Article II number 1 will be written as follows: The elected Officers of this Club shall consist of: Chairman, Vice-Chairman, Secretary, Treasurer, Activities Director, and two Trustees, one to be elected by a majority of the membership at the annual election. A second Trustee shall be the immediate past Chairman of the Club. If the immediate past Chairman declines the position, the second Trustee position will be elected by a majority of the membership at the annual election. The balloting shall be secret.
- Rewrite the wording for the duties of vice-chairman. The wording will be as follows: It shall be the duty of the vice-chairman to perform all the duties of the chairman in his absence and to be a liaison between the board and committee chairpersons.

A drawing was held to raffle off samples of adhesive backed masks for painting MGB rostyle wheels and heat shield material for MGB's that were given to Dave Engdahl.

and driving I went back to two events of 1982 and 1984. I fondly remembered that Nancy and I drove the TD to North Conway, New Hampshire in 1984 (alone) and had a wonderful time. This was to a T Registers event and we loved the area and the region. The drive was beautiful and prompted us to do it again in 1984 when they decided to hold the event at the same place as they did in '82. Only this time we drove the TF, Jim and Sue drove our TD and Charlie and Irene Searles drove their TF. Those two trips were written about in my MG (S)Miles number 3 and number 7. Needless to say it was a great time at both events and we vowed that sometime we had to go back.

In 1990 Nancy and I decided it was time to return to that area with the MG but this time we thought it would be nice if others wanted to join us on this trek. So the 1991 New England Mountain Adventure was born. We planned the trip and thanks to Don Stahl got all the maps we needed. My daughter in law Sue typed all the pages for the route books and George Haynes got all the copies made courtesy of Xerox. (Only I'm sure they didn't know it at the time.) Fifteen cars (ALL MG's) made the trip and there were no major breakdowns along the way. We went to the car show at Hildene in Manchester Vermont to start the adventure and then over to Gerry Gougen's Museum in Westminster, Vermont where he and Doris hosted a wonderful breakfast for us. From there it was up to North Conway New Hampshire. One of the nights in North Conway we all went to the Scottish Lion for dinner and much to our surprise the group had planned an impromptu Anniversary Party for Nancy and me. It was a great night, complete with a "wedding anniversary cake" and waitresses singing Happy Anniversary. From North Conway we went over to Stowe, Vermont and finally to Lake Placid and home. The total mileage for all the cars was 19,298 miles with the Potters logging the most miles of anyone at 1,544.

In 1993 being a glutton for punishment we (I) decided we would do it again and we limited the number of cars to 15. It was a good size group to work with and we felt that more cars would only cause logistical problems. One thing we always stressed on these trips was this was a "do your own thing" sort of adventure. We gave restaurant and sight seeing suggestions but never insisted that we all had to be tied at the hip. I suggested that people group up with others who preferred to drive at certain speeds and those that wanted to drive slower of faster were more than welcome to do so. We did seem to gather in the evenings and discuss the days events and who went where, and what they did while there.

NEMA MK II saw 15 cars make the complete adventure with another 8 couples joining us just for the first weekend. This was the adventure where I had alternate routes for those who wanted to explore some of the areas off our primary route more closely. A group of us also went up to Stowe for the British Invasion that fall, and later to Gerry Gougen's for his Fall Auto Jumble.

In 1994 we went to Hildene again and also to Stowe. Added to this was another trip to Gerry Gougen's but these were not Mountain Adventures. That was the year we won the two airline tickets to the UK raffled at the British Invasion. Keep that point in mind as it has a bearing coming up.

I guess I twisted Nancy's arm far enough for we hosted another NEMA in 1995. We had been in the UK for three weeks in May and I did have to do some hustling to get everything ready but it came off without a hitch and again we all had a great time. Once again in the fall we went back to Stowe and also to Gougen's Autojumble a few weeks later. Now to the in interesting part of that years driving. We calculated that we had driven about 8,000 miles that year in four different countries, driving three different cars on both sides of the Atlantic and on both sides of the roads. It's no wonder we were tired in September but not enough to miss the British Invasion at Stowe or Gerrys Gougens Autojumble.

Once again in 1997 we hosted NEMA IV. This time we had ten cars signed up and the trip went off without a hitch. We again did the Stowe trip in the fall and also were in the UK again for three weeks in May. This was another year with "too many miles in too many cars on both sides of the ocean on both sides of the roads" etc. etc.

We said that was going to be the last and urged someone else to take up the gauntlet. I had offered to help where I could. I had the information for the route books finished and would gladly give the computer disks to anyone that wanted to host such a trip. I had my fingers crossed but sadly no one took up my challenge.

We used the same routes again and visited the same places and once again it was a great trip. I can't remember exactly how many folks went on that trip but it had to be at least 12 cars. We did have a bit of a problem in Manchester getting rooms together due to the popularity of the Hildene show but we managed to split up the group and stayed in a few places and we made out fine. The rest of the trip was fine and there were

no problems with accommodations. We were surprised again with another impromptu anniversary get together in Stowe Vermont on the deck at Ye Olde England Inne. Chris Francis a good friend to some of us had set everything up and it was again a surprise for Nancy and me. Somewhere along the course of these adventures we got the nicknames of "Mom" and "Dad" and we wear those designations with a great deal of pride. Once again we did the same route but did stop at Peter Markowski's RPM Motor Sports in Vergennes, Vermont to see his shop and the cars he had in there for service. After a few hours of drooling it was back to reality and on to the ferry for the trip over to New York State. I vowed after that trip that I would not host another one but last year we did travel the same route with the Potter's and Colegrove's on an unofficial NEMA. That made six times that we've done that total route and each time it is just as good as the times before. (Except for our incident, with the MG going off the road. That I could have very well lived without.)

Unless you have traveled in the New England areas that we have, you really don't know what you are missing. There are some wonderful sports car roads and the scenery is breathtaking.

O JUST WHERE AM I GOING WITH ALL THIS? I guess I am hoping (and have been for some time) that someone would take up the challenge and host another Mountain Adventure. It really is not all that difficult. I have all the routes on a computer disk and would be willing to share that information with anyone who would like to do this. The hotels know us and are always happy for us to return, and it is not all that difficult to plan. The registration cost per car was \$15.00 and that covered the dash plaques, postage, and misc. odds and ends needed. The money that was left over always went to buying snacks and munchies for a BYOB party at the Green Granite in North Conway. This was a good time and place to go over the various stories everyone had to share about their days events and where they went and what they saw or bought. (Husbands should not read that last part because there is a fair (?) amount of buying on theses trips). I know that Nancy is guilty of that and on the first trip she managed to find a beautiful Icelandic full length coat on our first day out which she just had to have. Needless to say it went home via UPS. Don Stahl told Pat, on the last NEMA that they attended, at the end of the trip the only thing she could buy was a pair of earrings and those she had to wear home because there was no more room in the TF. AND their UPS bill was staggering. Also ask Gil about the difficulties he had getting something Betty had purchased into the back of the MGC. Dick Powers shot a wonderful video of the entire trip that year, with that as one of the "featured pieces".

I am still more than willing to help anyone taking on this trip and will offer as much or as little advice as needed.

Just one bit of advice or caution, I would plan the trip to take place before the school year ends because New England in the summer can get very crowded and the hotels fill up fast. Added to that, is the fact that North Conway in the summer is a complete zoo as far as tourists and accommodations are concerned. The Friday following our car show was the best time to start the trip. The original idea for the trip was to relax and have a good time after the show was over. So will someone think about this? PLEASE!!!



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"I thought I had half a tank ...?"

I thought I had half a tank of gas—we've only gone a few miles and now the gauge reads a quarter! I leave the house with 5/8 of a tank and the next time I glance at the gauge it is 1/2 and then 3/8 and then 1/2 again. So after a few more drives with the same exclamation to myself, I procured a suitable fuel gauge stick. The TRIUMPH makes this exceedingly practical because it is a "straight shot" from the filler to the bottom of the tank. Diagnosis and repair postponed for now. Sometime later I heard Leon Zak and John Baum talking about the fuel gauge sending unit. I said "tell me more". It turns out that John was having the same problem with his MGB. Leon says to take the sending unit out, remove cover and carefully clean the coil wires—not hard.

It's not hard, just cheap labor (you) and maybe a gasket. Of course you must take all necessary precautions for draining the fuel tank, having good ventilation and so forth. I am providing these photographs so that you may have a better idea of what you are getting into and see that it may be an easy fix and not \$25–\$50 for a new part.



This is the typical sending unit. The wire holding the float (not in the picture) hits the two stops for full and empty.

Two small self tapping screws hold the cover plate. Use the right sized screw driver since these may be tight due to corrosion. Note the dimple in the cover (marked with an arrow). This locates the pivot in the housing and consequently the wiper contact on the windings. (photo top right)

I used an old toothbrush and solvent to *gently* clean the "crud" from the wire windings. You may also see that the wiper arm has caused some wear to the windings. I would



resist the temptation to bend the wiper arm so that it exerts more pressure on the windings unless you are sure it is necessary and even then use moderation. Remember that the pivot moves back and forth in the housing so "seat" it before you check the wiper arm contact.



Finally, with a couple of jumper wires you can hook it up still out of the tank and by moving the float arm and watching the fuel gauge verify if you have been successful. Contact me if you have any questions. It's not that bad, really, Leon said so. ◀

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
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Bury Me In An Old Mowog Parts Box

It is March 5th and as I sit at my computer I am completely dry as to what to write about for April MOWOG. Many times I have been in this same situation and I usually come up with something at the last minute but I have been snowed in, frozen in, or just so much shut in for so long my mind is numb. I need a good long dose of some weather that is well above freezing so I can thaw out the brain. Last night here in Buffalo we set a record low at the local landing strip, zero. I can well live without that so let's hope it goes away in a few days.

Anyway enough of that. I've decided to bring you all up to date on MOWOG. If you have done your math you will now know we are in our eighteenth year of this column. What you might not know is that it has been picked up a few times by other publications and reprinted there. I have mentioned before that one column was picked up and printed in the magazine Safety Fast the organ of the MG Car Club of England. At least one column was reprinted in The Sacred Octagon the magazine of the New England MG T Register and one in Pur Sang the magazine of the American Bugatti Club. Just recently the column I wrote on my dad's S series Mercedes Benz was picked up and run in the Mercedes Benz Club magazine from around Omaha. This one was a complete surprise when I received a request to reprint it from the editor. As usual I was more than happy to let them run the article as it always gets more information out to the public. If only I could capitalize on it I might be motivated to come up with even better columns. This obviously will never be like winning the lottery but I can dream.

Last month I told about the book Offenhauser by Gordon White that I had just finished reading. At the moment I am deep into another book and it is around 650 pages. It is the autobiography of William F. Milliken called Equations of Motion. I am about one sixth of the way through having just started it the other night but his life story so far (he is 96 and still very active) is fascinating. I have progressed through the push car or coaster car era of youth and also the powered cycle cars. I have just completed the chapter where he builds and flies his own airplane.



It flew once and he then realized the mistakes he made in design so it was put away. It still exists in the Owls Head Transportation Museum in Maine (http://www.ohtm.org/).

Bill is one of those people who will never totally retire. If you are not familiar with him he is the same one that Milliken's corner at Watkins Glen is named after and Bill was head of flight research at Cornell Aeronautical Laboratory in Buffalo for many years. After being forced out at a mandatory retirement age he started his own research business and has done race car and vehicle dynamics for a good number of years. He has written a book by the same name Race Car and Vehicle Dynamics that is now the "bible" or textbook of the engineering students in these programs. I know it went through at least two printings because of this and possibly more. Much of this is very highly technical and way beyond us backyard mechanics. I do find it interesting and believe it or not I do understand a little of it such as pitch, yaw, and sideslip which all have to do with stability. This is true with both aircraft and automobiles. The big difference is if something fails at 10,000 feet it can very well be all over. With an automobile

you are at least still on the ground and hopefully upright. That is not to say you can't find you end in an automobile but just drive a new car and compare it to



a car twenty or thirty years old and notice the difference in handling characteristics. How they go about solving these problems or doing the math is something else. I won't go into this but in a future column I will try to give you a better review of the book. I might not finish it by next month but I will plug away at it.
