

Oh well it was a nice shot anyway and folks that got it (either were kind or lied through their teeth) said it was really nice and different.



Bolstered by this we (I) decided to try again the following year. This time we used the same setting but with the TF and this time I remembered to incorporate the barn. Again folks were kind and said they liked this one also. The die was cast and now we had to come up with something new every year.

I'm not alone in this mess I created for myself but rather have to look to my friend Jay Lockrow who does the same thing. Only he DRAWS the cards every year. (Show off!) I have to resort to photography to do mine, although one year I did use my drawing of my TF. Jays cards are really a joy to get and every year the car is part of the theme. I have every one of those cards and treasure them not because they are from a friend but one that is just as nuts as I am to continue to do this. We both have said we don't know how much longer we will be doing this but every year we manage to come up with something new and different. Not to be outdone by Jay I decided one year do a drawing of my TF. See the following shot. [above right]



The first card was done in 1971 and this is now 2007. If my arithmetic is correct, (which many times it's not) that means I've been doing these for 36 years. This year was particularly demanding because I knew exactly what I wanted to do but try as I would I couldn't get the photo to come out as I had expected it would. Thankfully I used a digital camera this year so the 87+ shots I did, that I was not satisfied with, went in the recycle bin and it didn't cost me a fortune as it had in the past using film.(Sorry EK Alumni) I finally got what I wanted and was satisfied with the result. Now all I had to do was get the 100+ prints made to send out. With the prints made, they have to be attached to the base of the card, also something I design every year and print on my computer. I also do an electronic version to send to friends that I know have E mail especially the ones outside the US. It does save a bit on postage.

A few years ago I did a "Christmas Wreath" (which was really the MG logo) using my model MG's as the sides and letters. That one had me talking to myself to get it just exactly the way I wanted it. I did the "M" using all green cars and the "G" using all red cars. It worked very well and again the recipients were very kind with their comments.



NE YEAR I REALLY GOT CARRIED AWAY AND SET UP A table top of the (models) TD, the TF and the B in front of a series of model pine trees. This was the photo on the outside of the card. On the inside was another photo of the three real cars with our pine trees as a backdrop. The greeting said: Happiness is Christmas toys, year round".

Nancy's favorite card is the year we did a collage (or assemblage' as my friend Leo Kaplan used to all them) of MG related names, items, memorabilia, and some antique wooden type. We sent along with the card a listing of all the items that were there and what they represented. That card generated more responses than any other card we'd ever done and apparently folks liked the challenge of seeing what we used and where it was. I still have the set up and some day may turn it into a table with glass over it or as a wall hanging. Now if I could only find a wall large and strong enough to hold it I'd be all set.



But my all time favorite was the year that I set up this photo. We had been in Vermont and Nancy found a cute English Bull Dog toy and bought it for me as a mascot for the B. We dubbed him Winston and he has traveled with us a great many times. So for Christmas that year Winston was featured sitting in the front of the TD. Of course he looked a little too plain just by himself with no clothing so we found a collar with a pewter MG Logo for him to wear as well as a proper British Cap and a red scarf. (After all it does get cold in December.) We did a number of variations of this card using just Winston. The first card was with the TD. Then we managed to find some smaller versions of Winston and used those along with him and the B for another card. They looked alright on the B but there was something missing that was apparent in the first card. For some reason the TD and the wreath and Winston just seemed to belong together. I'll let you be the judge of that.



Once again this year the cards are finished, the envelopes addressed and stamped and all that's left is the personal greeting on each one, then they're off in the mail to friends all over. Naturally the ones going outside the US have to go first but eventually they will all be sent out.

How long will I keep doing this? I really don't know. I haven't run out of ideas yet but They're getting harder to come up with every year. But I'll keep trying.

Valve Cover Racing Official Rules

Brooks Schneider

The Cars:

- The cars shall have no power source. All motive force is provided by gravity.
- Cars shall be based on actual rocker cover or cam cover from an MG or British made automobile engine.
- Wheelbase shall be no more than 24 inches. *Note: The staging lane is only 24 inches long.*
- Wheel track shall be no more than 14 inches.
- Cars must have 4 wheels, each no more than 6 inches in diameter.
- Cars shall weigh 12 pounds or less.
- Car design should allow the front wheels to touch a 2 inch high starting gate.
- Any car changed during the races is subject to inspection.

The Course:

- The course shall consist of a launch incline 8 feet long, followed by a level run of 20 feet.
- Two lanes shall divide the launch incline, each 2 feet wide. The incline shall be 2 feet high at the rear-most part and level with the course at the front edge. The front edge shall be mitered to provide a smooth transition from the incline to the run-out area.

- The official "Starting Line" shall be 2 feet from the rear edge of the incline. A mechanized starting gate, which is 2 inches high, shall be provided.
- The run-out section of the course shall consist of 2 lanes, each 3 feet wide. The lanes shall be clearly marked.
- The finish line shall be marked 20 feet from the front edge of the launch incline.

The Races:

- Cars will run in heats of 2 cars each.
- The cars are to be launched with their front wheels on the starting line. If your car design does not allow for this, it is at a disadvantage. The first car to have its front wheels cross the finish line is the winner. If neither car reaches the finish line, the car going further within its lane wins.
- If the wheels of a car should touch a lane marker, or cross over a lane marker, the car shall be disqualified. The competing car immediately becomes the winner.
- The winner of the round is the first car to win 2 races.
- Lanes are alternated between races.
- Winning cars will advance to the next round until all are eliminated but 1 car. Scoring is double-elimination to the finals. A car is eliminated after losing 2 rounds.



Bury Me In An Old Mowog Parts Box

Over the past two weeks I have been watching the new Ken Burns series on PBS called "The War." I saw an interview with Ken Burns shortly before this new series debuted and he mentioned he wanted to do this series before all the World War II veterans passed away. They are quickly disappearing at the rate of several hundred a day so time is of the essence. Take my own dad for an example (now gone 15 years). There are so many facets of automobile lore that most people have never so much as heard of less seen. For example Vintage Racing! I mentioned I didn't want to miss the Vintage Races at the Glen to a gal one day while making an appointment and she had heard of Watkins Glen but had no idea whatsoever of what Vintage Racing was or what it was all about. I recall mentioning Formula One at work more than once when I was in the work force and you might as well have been talking about hair coloring. Ever try telling a NASCAR fan that stock car racing is really the "Johnny come lately" of auto racing? Most of the others were around long before stockers were thought of. Stock car racing got

its start with the rum runners cars out performing the revenuers cars and then competing against themselves on old fairground tracks. Dirt track oval racing was around ages before this (Foremost, they were the guys that built the cars that out ran the revenuers) and so was road racing in Europe but not so much on this side of the pond until after WWII.

Here would be the chance to show how and why someone is willing to spend countless hours and money on a car that is probably older than the owner. Preserving something from the brass era like a Pierce Arrow or Thomas Flyer is something the average citizen just does not understand. However look at it through the eyes of someone like us that appreciate this sort of thing and we don't understand why there isn't more interest.



Why is it there are millions of dollars spent at auto parts stores on accessories, polishes, oil, parts when you can just take a car to a garage? Why do some people covet there cars like family keeping them out of the rain and foul weather and enjoying them only in nice weather? I can see a series that could last the good part of a month and still not touch all the facets. Will somebody draft this guy and let's put it on opposite one of the countless sporting events that I have no interest in. ◀
