

Cameron Argetsinger 1921 2008

On April 22nd, Cameron Argetsinger, the genius that made Watkins Glen synonymous with world class racing, passed away at his home in Burdette, NY. He was 87 and is survived by his wife of 67 years, Jean, nine children, 15 grandchildren and 13 greatgrandchildren.

The Tierno's and I attended his funeral Mass at St. Mary's on the Lake and heard John Bishop, founder of the International Motor Sports Association (IMSA), share memories of Cameron and his many contributions to racing. For the record, Cameron Argetsinger was the person who planned and organized the first postwar American road race, the Watkins Glen Grand Prix, on October 2, 1948 or "The Day They Stopped the Trains." Argetsinger brought full international racing to the Glen in 1958 and, from 1961-1980, the Formula 1 US Grand Prix. He also was executive director of the SCCA, vice president of Chaparral Cars, commissioner of IMSA and, from 2002-2007, president of the International Motor Racing Research Center. One or two of these accomplishments would be Hall of Fame material; and in 2005, he was part of the first group to be inducted into the SCCA Hall of Fame.

Argetsinger, a lawyer and Cornell graduate, had the vision and organizational skills that made the

Glen the wonderful racing venue we enjoy. But along with that, he was a racer at heart with his first race being the '48 Watkins Glen GP racing his MG TC. His last race was at Sebring in 1960 where he raced an Alfa Romeo Veloce. In between, he raced a Healey Silverstone, Ardent Alligator (Ford/Riley), Jag XK 120M and a Mercedes 300 SL, among others.

I had a chance to meet with him in 2004 while organizing the MGVR 50th Anniversary of the Collier Cup. He was keenly interested in that event and fondly remembered racing his TC in '48. He even asked for help finding that car and since he had all the numbers, we were able to trace it to Florida.

The Langswager's also have memories of Argetsinger. Gil said he was so impressed with the way we ran our All MG races, that he wanted our WNYMGCC to run the Concours at the Glen. Gil and Gordy Rogers met with Argetsinger and a three year contract was drawn up.

But I think it was Betty who really sealed the Concours deal. At our All MG races, Betty was at the entry gate and remembers: "A man drove up in a white Cadillac convertible. I asked him for a ticket or credentials, but he didn't have any. I told him he couldn't come in without them. About 20 minutes later, he returned with what he needed and I let him in. It was only much later that I realized it was Cameron Argetsinger!" I'm sure after "meeting" Betty, Argetsinger knew our MGCC was the club to do the Concours at the Glen.

At the funeral Mass, the Tierno's and I heard about a side of Argetsinger that few knew. His grandson, Tom Kanaley, told us in a most beautiful and eloquent way, how important family was to Cameron Argetsinger. His family, I believe, was more important than all his racing accomplishments combined.

By putting everything in motion back in 1948, Cameron Argetsinger changed Watkins Glen forever and perhaps the lives of many in our club. I know he did for me.

Long may his memory be with us. ◀

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





Good grief! Petrol is approaching four dollars a gallon. If it hasn't already gotten to that price by the time you read this I will be surprised. In a way I have to chuckle a little because for so many years we in the US had really cheap petrol while the rest of the world that had automobiles choked at four dollars per Imperial Gallon. You must recall seeing pictures of England, Japan and dozens of other countries with throngs on motorcycles and scooters. All this time that we were enjoying cheap petrol how many of you put up with the fact that we were looked down upon because we were driving small English or European cars with four cylinder engines that gave us better mileage. I have had six cylinder cars like my TR6 and Plymouth Duster but for all those years I had economical four cylinder cars. To this day I have never owned a car with a V8 engine. The closest I came was when I got married some thirty years ago my wife had a Buick Skylark with a V8. After that died we had a four cylinder.

Like so many people many of my friends (With Chevy V8 and Ford V8s) looked at me with question marks in there heads. Why would anyone get a four cylinder when you could get a hulking V8 with tons of torque and top speeds of over the century mark? Well I guess I'm a cheap son of a gun and now it has finally come to be that all along I was doing the right thing. What so many of these friends did not realize was that in many countries, like England, petrol was always very expensive compared with the US. When I was in England back in 1974 even then I was amazed at the price per Imperial gallon. People were still using motorcycles and scooters and walking to the market instead of driving.

Learning how to drive on something like a Morris, VW, Opel or any of the dozens of makes that appeared on our shores would have made a lot better drivers out of those that learned to drive on a V8 automagic.

Take the Morris Minor for example, a little four cylinder engine married to a four speed gearbox and you can get upwards of forty miles to the gallon. Driven properly you might even get a little more. I learned to drive in the driveway on an MG TC and later a Volkswagen with a four speed box. Learning how to "row" a thirty six horsepower VW up and down the hills of Ithaca NY made you attuned to keeping the RPM's up and learning how to downshift to get up the hills. Also, for example, coming across a road like route 20A you come down off one hill and get the RPM's up so you can get halfway up the next before you have to downshift. You don't just keep it in fourth gear and lug it up the hills. You LEARN how to drive properly and get the most out of the car with a small displacement engine unless of course you have some character in front of you that insists on doing forty miles an hour all the time.

In the states people are always in a hurry to go nowhere. Here in the states they are talking about mandating something like thirty six to forty miles to the gallon for the automakers. This is fine but some people will never learn to drive properly no matter what sort of vehicle you put them in.

Also let's not forget that V8s are here to stay. If for example you are towing a race car, boat, horses or a trailer full of drugs you need the flexibility of a V8 and most four cylinders will not haul those sorts of loads with the exception of some diesels and that fuel is now more expensive than petrol. The main thing is to learn how to get the most out of your vehicle without wasting fuel. After all whiskey used to be more expensive but the way things age going we might be running our vehicles on Jack Daniels. \triangleleft
