





Tom Atkinson, the photographer, happened by just after this little problem

It happened to Mary & I and our BGT and I asked him if he would document the dilemma and forward the photos to me, which he did. He's from the Albany area and I do not know him but he told me he works for SUNY Albany.

This is what happens when you think the car is on level ground and there's no need to use the emergency brake. The problem happened last week in the town where we live - Huron.

Tom requested to know how we got out of the problem and here's my reply -

Thanks so much for the great photos! First thing was 2 tow trucks from Butler arrived and they were both roll backs - not what was needed. The leader wanted to simply hook a cable to the rear axle and pull it out which was not acceptable to me as I thought there would be damage the front end judging by how far down the front wheels were hanging. They told me that was the only way they would do it and I could take it or leave it. I told them no and they left. I then contacted AAA again and they sent another two tow trucks from Alton and these fellows wanted to lift up the front end by placing a huge thick strap around the front of the car to lift up and right which I also rejected. Then one of them suggested using a long steel bar under the "A" frame to lift the front wheels higher while the tow truck operator pulled back - this worked great and there was almost no damage at all to the car - just a little paint loss where it rubbed the guard rail. Someone called the Sheriff and he stayed the whole time as it was well after dark when this task was completed. A couple of days later the town moved the guardrail back several feet and all is ok. So much for an evening pleasure ride.

# Legislative Quick Hits


California Emissions Tests: SAN-opposed legislation to require annual Smog check inspections for vehicles 15 years old and older was held in the California Assembly Appropriations Committee and is essentially dead for the year. The bill would also have required that funds generated through the additional inspection fees be deposited into an account which could have been used to scrap older cars. Pre-1976 motor vehicles would have remained exempt under the measure. The SAN launched a statewide lobbying campaign to oppose the bill.

California Scrappage: SAN is opposing a California Air Resources Board (CARB) proposal to spend roughly \$30 million annually to augment the State's existing vehicle scrappage program. The proposal would provide incentives for vehicles not currently eligible under the Consumer Assistance Program by removing the existing requirements that vehicles be subject to and fail Smog Check to participate. CARB is specifically targeting for scrappage pre-1976

vehicles that are not currently required to undergo Smock Check inspections. According to CARB, allowing vehicles that are not currently undergoing registration or that have passed their Smog Check to participate greatly expands the vehicle population that can be retired. Participants would receive \$1,000 per vehicle or \$1,500 per vehicle if they meet low-income requirements. The proposal would also establish a pilot voucher program in the South Coast and San Joaquin Valley air basins that targets the highestemitting vehicles and requires their replacement with newer, cleaner vehicles. Consumers would retire their vehicle at a participating dismantler, receiving an immediate compensation of \$1,000-\$1,500 for vehicle retirement. Consumers could then redeem their voucher at participating car dealerships toward the purchase of a replacement vehicle. CARB is proposing that the voucher compensation be \$2,000 or \$2,500 per vehicle depending on income level.

Michigan Inoperable Vehicles: A version of SEMA-model legislation has been reintroduced in the Michigan State Legislature that would outlaw local zoning ordinances that prohibit the hobby of collecting and restoring motor vehicles. Junked, wrecked or inoperable vehicles, including parts cars, stored on private property could still require screening from public view by fencing, vegetation or other means. The bill has been referred to the Senate Committee on Local, Urban and State Affairs.

Ohio Street Rods/Customs: SEMA model legislation to create a vehicle registration and titling classification for street rods and custom vehicles and provide for special license plates for these vehicles has been reintroduced in the Ohio State Legislature. The bill defines a street rod as an altered vehicle manufactured before 1949 and a custom as an altered vehicle at least 25 years old and manufactured after 1948. The bill allows kit cars and replica vehicles to be assigned a certificate of title bearing the same model-year designation that the body of the vehicle was constructed to resemble.



# Bury Me In An Old Mowog Parts Box

One of the good things about being a motor head is the simple fact that you don't have to limit yourself to one area of the motoring world. Now if you are reading this I can pretty much assume that you are a sports car aficionado and like those things directly related. However there is much more in the motoring world. For example racing car engines are generally much more modified than those of stock engines and a whole new world opens up when you start studying how and why to modify a stock engine to get the most potential from it. There are of course pros and cons to these modifications and you must decide if the modification is worth the chance of say higher compression which could very well destroy an engine if you get it to high. Reliability is always a factor in such modifications and must be thought out ahead of time. Frequently, once a modification has been made you can't go back to standard unless you start over with a new block, cylinder head or what have you. There are however,

many more areas of motors and what they power. One time a few years back I had the opportunity to attend a vintage tractor and antique farm equipment down the road in Pennsylvania. Now I have no thoughts on starting in this hobby but I found it most interesting. The variety of tractors that have been available over the years and some of the equipment it powered is quite amazing. I was also most interested in the old single cylinder hit and miss engines that powered so much of early farm machinery. One of the members of the Boston Valley Breakfast and Motoring Guild has gotten himself interested in this sort of thing and his discussions usually center on his favorite brand of Shaw tractors.

Over the years I have mentioned outboard motors and that category fits well into this column. These are gasoline powered of both two and four cycle design and the number of makes is mind boggling especially if you go back a few years.

If you want to get interested in marine engines this is another world. The mere size of some of these units is amazing. I have seen marine engines that are bigger than my house. Once these are installed I doubt if they are ever removed. One night I was with my brother in law and we were down near Delevan N.Y. He took me into a building that had about six huge Worthington industrial engines. These are used to generate electricity and the heat from the engines was used to heat the nearby school. One of the engines was partially dismantled and the pistons were out on the floor. They must have been close to twenty four inches in diameter. Later on he managed to give me a valve from one of the engines and the head was as

big as a coffee cup saucer and the stem a bit larger than a quarter and over a foot long. I recall asking one of the guys working on the engine how they were able to get the piston out of the bore. "Overhead crane" was the simple answer and they were dismantling this particular engine because it had a bent crankshaft. These guys said yes they could have it straighten but the thing was as big as my MG.

This afternoon I was having a discussion with a friend and the subject of Crosley automobiles came up. These were built back in the late 40's and early 50's. There are a few around but they were way ahead of there time and people wanted "Big Cars" and as gasoline was cheap in those days Crosley never really had a chance. However the engines of these cars wound up in a good number of specials as they were very light four cylinders with an integral head like an Offenhauser or Bugatti. Many of the early Siatas in the early 50's were fitted with Crosleys. They would wind to a high rpm and were fairly reliable. A good number of these engines also wound up in race boats also as the high rpm made them competitive. Engines are totally captivating if you start to study the different designs and ideas used over the years. It is also interesting to see who stole what idea from whom. For example a couple of Miller 91's were once taken to Europe to run at Monza at the Italian Grand Prix. These were oval track cars and were not made for a road course. They tried anyway and at least one of the two Millers cracked the front wheel drive gear casing. The cars were sold by Leon Duray to Ettore Bugatti and not long after the type 57 Bugatti appeared with and engine that was almost a total copy of the Miller. Fast forward to 1964 and the Millers were discovered in a Bugatti factory warehouse with a large assortment of Bugattis. They were purchased by Griffith Borgeson and one is in the Indianapolis Motor Speedway Museum (ex Leon Duray car) and the Packard Cable Special is in the Smithsonian Institution. Miller engines alone are fascinating study and several books alone have been written on the subject. But let's save that for another time.
