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
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#### Add Your Name to the MGCC Endowed Scholarship Plaque



#### Memories of racing a 1960 BMC Sebring MGA Twin Cam and Healey 3000

In the first part of this article (<u>Spokes</u> Vol.52, No.11), you may remember that Bob Deull was instrumental in getting five '60 BMC Factory Sebring cars (3 MGA Twin Cams & 2 Healey 3000's) to Buffalo. Most of us would be happy to have a chance to drive a factory racer let alone own one. But Bob Deull, has had the pleasure of owning and racing a Sebring MGA Twin Cam <u>and</u> Sebring Healey 3000. To be exact, Bob owned both BMC practice or "P" cars. He purchased and raced the MGA Twin Cam a few months after the '60 Sebring 12-hour and in 1986, he purchased the Sebring Healey from Dick Ecklund.

My first sports car was a Big Healey that I drove for 4 years and for the last 20 years, I've owned and raced an MGA. From my experience, these cars are very different in the way they feel and handle and the technique needed to drive them fast. Bob remembers:

"Dick, driving the Twin Cam was very different from the Healey. The car handled very well, I don't ever remember spinning the car. At the Glen it would pull 6500 rpm's, about 117, down the front straight. No wonder I had to replace bearings after every 2 races!"

"The Healey was a little harder getting used to. I spun that car a lot, starting when I drove it at the Sundown Grand Prix at Harewood, Ontario when Dick Ecklund owned the car in 1960. I was second driver out about 5:30 pm (the race started at 4 pm and ended at 10 pm). On the first turn I did a 360, didn't know at the time, but I spun on gas a team mate's Corvette was leaking all around the track. . . . Fast Forward 32 years to 1992 when I owned and raced the car again. I got to feel comfortable in the car and learned its handling characteristics. I did spin it a few more times and once in my own oil when I blew the engine at the Glen. During the years I raced the Healey up to 2006, it felt like an old shoe. Got to really enjoy driving the car. I had mixed feelings about selling the Healey because of my close friendship with Dick Ecklund."

Bob also mentioned that the Healeys and Twin Cams were made at the MG works at Abingdon. They had 4 wheel disc brakes (standard on the Twin Cam) and 25

gallon gas tanks with outside filler caps. The Healeys had 2-seat bodies, no overdrive and 14 leaf rear springs.

The Sebring cars were all run in at the Silverstone track in England before being shipped to the US. Bob isn't sure about his Twin Cam, but knows that the famous English racer, Jack Sears, drove his Healey at Silverstone.

So there you have more Secrets of the 1960 BMC Sebring race cars. Possibly a few more to come, but before that happens, the author would like to thank Bob Deull and Jack Cudmore for supplying most of these historic pictures and Annabelle Tescione for making some of them look so good.

Before continuing with our discussion of the cars from MG some time must be taken to explain that things were not as simple then as they are now. In our day cars are produced in annual batches and all the cars within a given year (although this 'year' is a Fall to Fall affair) are the same type and series. In fact, it is very unusual for a manufacturer to make any change once his production run has started. However, in the early days of MG this was not the case. Batches of cars were built and the time of the introduction and termination was controlled by their acceptance and by the fact that there was an improved model available for introduction. The number of cars that were built of any one type were very small by today's production figures. For instance, there were 3,235 M type Midgets built and 44 C types. Now, I do not think that Detroit would be too excited about that sort of production in a day, and yet we are talking about a four year span, late 1928 until mid-1932. It should also be understood that the factory did not build one type at a time. In fact, during the time span that we have discussed, the factory was building 18/80 Mk I and II, 18/100 Six Mk III, M types and C types and a couple of others that we have not yet discussed. The factory must have been a very interesting place. I have done some research and found at one period the factory was building five types at the same time. This could have produced some logistic problems! Also at this time the move to Abingdon was made. We now have cars that are featuring the letters of the alphabet to distinguish them (although not necessarily in the order that we find them) and that cars are being created in Abingdon, and so this series can now use its title without fear. The factory was not new. It was not built for MG. It seems that MG rarely had anything new, they have always managed to improve upon what someone else has provided. The factory was part of the Pavlova Leather Company's premises, and I am afraid that I am not aware of the company's claim to fame. Maybe they built a fast and safe pair of shoes? Anyway, the address of the company became the one with which we are all familiar. The town of Abingdon-on-Thames is very old and quiet and bears no outstanding history. When MG settled there beside Father Thames, many of the names that would eventually become household words were with the company - Cousins, Hounslow, Reg Jackson, Syd Enever, to list a few. In one reference work that I have. they point out that a few weeks after the factory

inaugural party was held, Henry Ford bought his son an MG Midget.' That car is now in the Ford Museum. It was found, after many years is disuse, in a garage on the Ford estate. Its interest and beauty were noted and it was decided that the car should be cleaned up and displayed in the museum. Soon after it found its way to the museum and the light of day, some members of the MGCC (the faithful) noted that the radiator cap was missing and felt that this was inexcusable. They wrote to the factory and asked if the deficiency could not be rectified. You might imagine that in the midfifties (if my memory serves) the factory did not have too many M type spares in hand, but word was circulated through the plant that a radiator cap for an M' was needed. One day, the story goes, someone aware of the need was talking to a foreman in his office and suddenly noted a paper weight that worthy was using. He checked and found that what he had was a radiator cap for an M! It was polished, refurbished and shipped to the States. There members of the MGCC, with due ceremony, screwed on the cap and the car became complete and as you see it today. I tell you this story to point out, once again, that the MG factory never threw anything away as it might come in useful. As a true follower, you should see my workshop! (D TYPE) The next type of MG to emerge was the D' type. It came into production in late 1931 and continued until mid-1932, and the complete production amounted to 250 cars. They were fourseaters. the car was built upon a lengthened C chassis. The C' was 81" wheelbase and this was increased to 84" and later 86". The rear of the body was squared off and the rear seats were astern of the rear axle, and there was its problem area. The engine was the same as fitted to the C' and with 27 hp and four passengers it was just a mite underpowered. Also, when the rear seats were occupied, the effect upon the road holding was most unpleasant. It was an attempt to offer a sportscar that could handle more than the usual two people. This is a problem that has beset the designers as long as there have been sportscars and it is interesting to see them wrestle with the same problem today. The sportscar needs to be small and equipped with good power to weight ratio. It needs to be small to be handy and light on the controls. If we ask for room to add the additional two passengers the car must be larger and heavier and the power to weight ratio suffers and we have a center of gravity that will move around with the addition or deletion of the additional

passengers. The result today we see that the designer usually gives up and produces something that is neither fish nor fowl, that her calls a "2 plus 2." I do not criticize. I cannot do better. I merely state the fact as I see it. We have noted the low powers that were available in the Midgets of the period. It would be doubtless interesting to introduce a car with more power. The Midget were Eights as related and it would be fun to have a twelve horse powered version. Also at this time there was a number of "light sixes" introduced. The fours of the time were quite rough running (more so than now, as balancing is better understood). In 1930 the Wolseley 'Hornet' was introduced. It was not a great car but it had a light six cylinder engine which was available to branches of the Morris organization. It led to the introduction of the F' type and featured a 1271cc six cylinder overhead cam engine that looked much like the M' series of engines except that it was a six. It had the same vertical mounted generator at the front of the block. The car was built in four-seater, two-seater and saloon forms. The wheelbase was 94" (the same as the TC, TD, and TF). The transmission was a four speed unit, by ENV. There was a question of the name and as the Midget' had been so successful and this was a larger car, it was easy to go to the Magna and this was the orientation of the series. Both the D and the F were fitted with center lock wheels rather than the old bolt-on units. (F1 SALONETTE) The F types looked more rakish than the preceding types and, of course, they were longer. The Midgets were short and sort of stumpy looking, but this was not apparent with the Magna.' The original offering was the F1' which was a fourseater and looked maybe faster than it was. It was also a good looking car with the top up, which was unusual for this time period. The F2' was a two-seater with a 'J2' body style (more later) and the F3 was a fourseater. The F2 and F3' were fitted with larger brake drums, from 8" of the previous model to 12 inches. The F' types were built from late 1931 until late 1932 and there were 1250 of them. The engine produced 37 hp at 4,100 rpm, and this was a welcome increase in available power. Also a feature to be noted was the fitment of twin SU's. Apart from the five 18/100 Mark III that were built this was the first MG that featured what was to become almost required wear for any MG from that time until the past couple of years. Now, due to the problems associated with smog

control, the MG has reverted to a single carburetor, if you can imagine such a thing!

#### Valve Cover Rules

#### The Cars:

- The cars shall have no power source. All motive force is provided by gravity.
- Cars shall be based on actual rocker box (cover) or cam cover from an MG or British made automobile engine.
- Wheelbase shall be no more than 24 inches. Note: The staging lane is only 24 inches long.
- Wheel Track hall be no more than 14 inches.
- Cars must have 4 wheels each no more than 6 inches in diameter.
- Cars shall weigh 12 pounds or less
- Car design should allow the front wheels to touch a 2 inch high starting gate.
- Any car changed during the race is subject too inspection

#### The Course:

- The course shall consist of a launch incline 8 feet long, followed by a level run of 20 feet.
- Two lanes shall divide the launch incline, each 2 feet wide. The incline shall be 2 feet high at the rear-most part and level with the course at the front edge. The front edge shall be mitered to provide a smooth transition from the incline to the run-out area.
- The official "Starting Line" shall be 2 feet from the rear edge of the of the incline. A mechanized starting gate, which is 2 inches high, shall be provided.
- The Run out section of the course shall consist of 2 lanes, each 3 feet wide. The lanes shall be clearly marked.
- The finish line shall be marked 20 feet from the front edge of the launch incline.

#### The Races:

- Cars will run in heats of 2 cars each.
- The cars are to be launched with their front wheels on the starting line. If your car design does not allow for this, it
  is at a disadvantage. The first car to have its front wheels cross the finish line is the winner. If neither car reaches
  the finish line, the car going further within its lane wins.
- If the wheels of a car should touch a lane marker, or cross over a lane marker, the car shall be disqualified. The competing car immediately becomes the winner.
- The winner of the round is the first car to win 2 races.
- Lanes are alternated between races.
- Winning cars will advance to the next round until all are eliminated but 1 car. Scoring is double-elimination to the finals. A car is eliminated after losing 2 rounds.

DRILL PRESS: A tall upright machine useful for suddenly snatching flat metal bar stock out of your hands so that it smacks you in the chest and flings your beer across the room, denting the freshly-painted project which you had carefully set in the corner where nothing could get to it.

WIRE WHEEL: Cleans paint off bolts and then throws them somewhere under the workbench with the speed of light. Also removes fingerprints and hard-earned calluses from fingers in about the time it takes you to say, 'Oh sh--!'

SKIL SAW: A portable cutting tool used to make studs too short.

PLIERS: Used to round off bolt heads. Sometimes used in the creation of blood-blisters.

BELT SANDER: An electric sanding tool commonly used to convert minor touch-up jobs into major refinishing jobs.

TWO-TON ENGINE HOIST: A tool for testing the maximum tensile strength of everything you forgot to disconnect

PHILLIPS SCREWDRIVER: Normally used to stab the vacuum seals under lids or for opening old-style paper-and-tin oil cans and splashing oil on your shirt; but can also be used, as the name implies, to strip out Phillips screw heads.

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#### New York Collector Car Legislation Update

By Don McConnell

Here is a up date as to what is happening in the New York State Legislature with laws effecting the collector hobby.

#### New York A.B. 10698

Creates a \$100 one-time fee that would replace the current annual fee of \$28.75 for the registration of historical motor vehicles. Bill was not enacted into law.

#### New York A.B. 1235

Provides that no automotive refinish material labeled "for professional use only" can be sold unless the purchaser demonstrates and meets all local ordinances for the use and application of the material, denying amateur hobbyists the opportunity to paint their own hobby cars. Bill was not enacted into law.

#### New York A.B. 2800

Charges higher toll and registration fees for vehicles based on the vehicle's weight, emissions and fuel-efficiency ratings. Bill was not enacted into law

Ethanol: The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) confirmed that there is insufficient test data to permit E15 to be used in model-year '00 and older light-duty motor vehicles. The SAN has consistently voiced concern that ethanol increases water formation, which can create formic acid that corrodes metals, plastics and rubber. On October 13, the EPA issued a waiver to permit the use of E15 in '07 and newer model-year vehicles. The agency is still gathering data to determine whether to permit its use in '01–'06 model-year vehicles. The EPA's ruling responds to a request from the ethanol industry to raise the ethanol content in gasoline from 10% to 15%. The SAN will continue to oppose E15 until there are conclusive scientific findings that demonstrate that it will not harm automobiles of any age as a result of corrosion or other chemical incompatibilities.
