#### **How Long Will It Run?**

Did you happen to attend the MG Car Club Sports Car Festival this year? Well at the festival this year there was a new attraction... it was a twist on the 50/50 drawing where your \$2.00 ticket selected a time when a donated car would stop running. The premise was simple: Wilbert's U-Pull-it, donated a car, we would drain the oil,. start the car, and let it run till it died. The 50/50 winner would hold the time slot when the car stopped running.

For those who don't like to read long articles, I'll cut to the chase and tell you that the car ran for much longer than anyone would believe, but there's more to the story, so please read on.

First let me tell you a bit about the car. It was a 1997 Buick Park Avenue with a General Motors, 3800cc,V6 engine. The car registered 214,584 miles on the odometer so this was a very well used car. A look at the well worn, plush leather interior gave testimony to the fact that the *mileage was accurate. People* came to see the car and bought squares thinking the car would stop running within about 20 minutes. At 12:00 noon, we had sold about 50% of the squares each representing a 15 second time slot in an hour that was on the board. The bottom half of the board beyond 30 minutes was fairly sparse with a few guesses in the over 40 minute range.

To show the disbelievers how well the car ran with 214,000 miles on it, we started it up at noon and let everyone hear it run. It was a quiet running vehicle even with all those miles on it. I shut it off after 2 minutes of running and proceeded to drain the oil while my assistants, Mike Harrison and Marlene Rzepkowski rang up many more sales of squares above 30 minutes. In all we sold 208 of the possible 240, fifteen second time slots. The oil was collected in my drain pan and placed in a clear plastic container in front of the car for all to see. Many asked to have me show them the dipstick, I obliged, and it was dry, the oil was drained.

At 1:00 we started the car and left it idle. The car purred softly and many heads listened close to make sure it was running. Leon got in the drivers seat and proudly announced that the engine oil lamp was clearly lit, the check engine light was clearly on and the car was idling nicely. The temperature rose to just 1 tick above normal and stayed there. The car ran on...and on...and on.

We made the same square good for the second hour as it was in the first. So if you owned the 30 minute square, it would be valid again at 1 hour and 30 minutes.... and the car ran on.

Finally at 3:00 PM after 2 hours of running, we declared the MG Car Club the winner of the 50/50 pot, but added a new twist. At 3:00 PM we dropped a large landscape brick on the accelerator. We changed each 15 second slot on the board into a portion of a minute instead of an hour and would give out a consolation prize to the owner of the seconds represented by the time slot when the car died.

With a 10 pound brick on the accelerator the engine roared to max RPM. The electronics tried to limit the RPM and the car sounded like someone was in it revving the engine then pulling back a little and revving it to max again. Vroom, Vroom, Vroom, Vroom.... After a minute or 2 at this breakneck pace, the smoke began to billow. It was coming from various places in the engine compartment and also from the exhaust system under the car. At about 5 minutes of running with a brick on the pedal, fires under the hood erupted and Doug Scribner provided a fire extinguisher to keep things in control. With the fires out the car still ran on. Blasts of red hot molten stuff began to shoot from the exhaust, a minor grass fire erupted at the tailpipe and was again extinguished with the remainder of the donated fire extinguisher.

Finally at about 7 minutes, the car slowed significantly, but the brick was still on the accelerator. Cough, sputter, wheeze.... thinking it was about to die we got ready to hit the stop watch, then it sprang to life again as the electronics said to the engine, "giddy-up old boy." Finally after a couple of valiant tries, the engine died at 2 hours, 8 minutes and 19 seconds. Sue Harrison was the consolation prize winner as her pick at 19 minutes turned out to be good at the 2 hour, 8 minute and 19.0 second mark.

What is the moral of the story? First and foremost, Buick makes a heck of an engine. Please let everyone at Wilbert's U-Pull-It know we appreciate their donation to "how long it will run". Maybe next year they will donate again and we will drain the oil AND the coolant? Maybe it will die sooner? Hopefully I'll see you at the car show next year with a slightly different twist on "how long will it run?".


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#### "What Have I Done?"

Here is a reprint of the first parts of a story from 1998-1999

Il bought a basket case. That is, I bought a 53 MGTD that came in boxes like a jigsaw puzzle. It is apart. It is a rolling chassis with tires, engine, tranny and the body tub but the rest is in pieces and parts packed in boxes. I brought it home on a trailer and the rest filled the back of the van. When I excitedly tell people of my deed they don't know weather to congratulate me or share condolences. I'm excited.

This is likely to be the first quarterly report on my progress. I'm guessing this is a 3 year project to get it back on the road. Why did I do it? To save an old MG from the scrap yard and just the dream of driving her again. I'm targeting the Halloween Rally 2001 for her debut (yeah right!). At the moment, the only parts it seems to be missing are the keys, hand crank, spare tire and steering wheel. The .rest appears to be there somewhere in different states of disrepair. Fools rush in ...

Joeanna has informed me we now own his and her MG's. Hers is the white 74 MGB, you know the one that runs. Mine is the other thing taking up the rest of the garage I just introduced you to.

My plans are to start with the frame, then coachwork, then engine, then interior. Sounds easy enough.

I've never had a TD before so I'm going to need lots of help. That is where this club really shines, in sharing their expertise. One of the first things I've been suggested to do is have an inventory party, to tag and bag all the various parts. I'll miss the next meeting being in Florida on vaco but \'vill call around and set a date for it soon. If you'd like to help let me know.

Sooooo here we go starting on an exciting journey.

Who knows where it might lead. That is what life is all about. Only 11 more quarterly reports and I should be finished (yeah, right!).

What have I done?

What have I done? The meaning of this question has literally, unintentionally, evolved from questioning my own sanity, upon purchasing the old TD "in a box", into what have I accomplished lately towards its restoration. The first step in any trip is a vision of where your going. My vision is a frame up restoration I'll be proud to drive.

I have spent most of the last few months planning, getting organized, finding out what parts

are there (and not there) and where they go. The first inventory session went well with lots of interesting tidbits found. So far, I'm only missing the steering wheel, starter hand crank, keys and the spare tire & wheel.

Everything else does appear to be there!!! I've had lots of help from the more knowledgeable members of the club( who is almost everybody because I know very little about TD's, as yet). I had to start somewhere.

I cleaned out the garage!

Actually, I have spent most of my time getting the garage in shape to do this job. I added a 5 horsepower air compressor which had to be hard wired on its own 220V I5 amp. line. I bought some air tools (grinders, impact wrench, sanders, etc.), and basically got my act together. I borrowed a wooden subframe (on wheels) to put the car onto so I don't break my back reaching down all the time and can move it around the garage more easily.

I discovered a neighbor two doors away that has a '52TD in a similar state of disassembly!!!! They just moved in. He's had it for years and he has the frame done and is doing the body work now. Currently, it is being used as a couch in his basement to watch TV. But, that is another story.

The front end will be rebuilt at British Auto Salvage, the shocks are off and sent for rebuild also. The frame and wheels are being sandblasted. I have ordered 5 new tires and tubes. I just noticed one of the rear leaf springs is broken. The brake lines, shoes, master & slave cylinders are all being resleeved, rebuilt or replaced. The seals on the differential are on order. Plan is to paint the frame and reassemble all of the above before the end of the year. I am also looking for an MGA or Magnette differential (4.33 or 4.55:1) so I can change the gear ratio. Anyone out there have one they are willing to part with???

I went to Carlisle, for my first time, and there I acquired 4 hubcaps, a couple of rims, a steering wheel in need of repair, a rear leaf spring and a frame paint kit. I just missed out on an MGA gear set. It was fun looking for the stuff, although the rain slowed us down a bit.

I found a hand crank in California, acquired from another club member who contacted me after

reading my first article about the restoration. Thanks Dan.

The interaction with the people during the rebuild is just as much fun as the interaction with the machinery. I've met so many nice people who share their experiences while doing this job. It still amazes me. MG people are just great!

It just dawned on me I'll have to name her soon. I'll have to ask for some suggestions from my mother-in-law (who was born is Leicester, England) for some traditional British names. She'll like that. The character of the car, as she goes together, will ultimately tell me what to name her.

What have I done????.

The ongoing saga of a frame up restoration of a '53 MGTD.

The TD's frame is off being sandblasted, finally. The front end was rusty and required lots of heat to take it apart. Removing the cotter pins was time consuming, until I got a tip - they are soft and can be torqued off. The ball joints and pickle fork had lots of interaction and came loose after a few choice words were spoken. The rack & pinion assembly looks good, even the rubber end caps are not cracked. One of the rear leaf springs was broken and I had to cut the bolts off with a hack saw (and took out a little of the frame mount which now needs to be welded). Luckily, one of the club members found two rear TD springs at Carlisle and is willing to sell them to me for what he paid for them. The front coil springs both broke when I took them off, too. I have ordered new ones. The steel sleeves on the A arm pivot are rusted solid and won't release the bolt - I suspect they will have to be cut off also. I now have 6 steel wheels that run true. The shocks are sitting in a box waiting to be sent for rebuild. I have been bagging and tagging all the parts.

Wife, Joeanna, ordered a TD restoration book which finally arrived after we reminded someone at Watkins Glen that we indeed had sent the money but hadn't gotten the book. Small world. Also while at the Glen we saw many TD's and have decided on a color scheme. It will be two tone, along the lines of the "Cream & Crackers" racing team with a cream body and reddish brown fenders (to match the red interior).

Then the storm hit. To help clean out the garage we had decided to build a 8' X 10' storage shed out back The shed went up quite nicely on a Friday, the storm flattened it on Sunday of Labor Day weekend. The tree was 5 feet in diameter and 80 feet tall,

the shed was no match for it. It took over a month to get the trees cut up, removed and the shed back up. That is why this article is a month late. I've gotten way behind schedule (no surprise there). I have a recovery plan, however. I am installing (with lots of help from the club) a downdraft furnace to heat my garage. This should enable me to continue on the project over the winter months and actually increase the clockspeed of the car getting onto the road.

Future plans include resleeving the brakes cylinders, painting the frame and rebuilding the brakes, including stainless steel lines. I may also change the rear gears while the differential is out. TBD.
