

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Valve Cover Racing Rules

The Cars:

- The cars shall have no power source. All motive force is provided by gravity.
- Cars shall be based on actual rocker box (cover) or cam cover from an MG or British made automobile engine.
- Wheelbase shall be no more than 24 inches. Note: The staging lane is only 24 inches long.
- · Wheel Track hall be no more than 14 inches.
- Cars must have 4 wheels each no more than 6 inches in diameter.
- Cars shall weigh 12 pounds or less
- Car design should allow the front wheels to touch a 2 inch high starting gate.
- Any car changed during the race is subject too inspection

The Course:

- The course shall consist of a launch incline 8 feet long, followed by a level run of 20 feet.
- Two lanes shall divide the launch incline, each 2 feet wide. The incline shall be 2 feet high at the rear-most part and level with the course at the front edge. The front edge shall be mitered to provide a smooth transition from the incline to the run-out area.

- The official "Starting Line" shall be 2 feet from the rear edge of the of the incline. A mechanized starting gate, which is 2 inches high, shall be provided.
- The Run out section of the course shall consist of 2 lanes, each 3 feet wide. The lanes shall be clearly marked.
- The finish line shall be marked 20 feet from the front edge of the launch incline.

The Races:

- Cars will run in heats of 2 cars each.
- The cars are to be launched with their front wheels on the starting line. If your car design does not allow for this, it is at a disadvantage. The first car to have its front wheels cross the finish line is the winner. If neither car reaches the finish line, the car going further within its lane wins.
- If the wheels of a car should touch a lane marker, or cross over a lane marker, the car shall be disqualified. The competing car immediately becomes the winner.
- The winner of the round is the first car to win 2 races.
- Lanes are alternated between races.
- Winning cars will advance to the next round until all are eliminated but 1 car. Scoring is double-elimination to the finals. A car is eliminated after losing 2 rounds.

My First Car:

"My first car was a 1962 Ford Falcon station wagon. My Dad bought it for \$150 at McEvoy Dodge because he thought the '60 Ford I wanted to buy from a friend was a junker. The Falcon wasn't far behind. It did have a cool stealth feature though. When stopped, the car would be enveloped in a massive cloud of oil smoke which emanated from a breather tube below the block. It was sometimes difficult to discern whether the traffic light had changed. I drove this thing until I smacked it up while watching my sister swat a mosquito on the windshield. Which takes me to...

My First Sports Car:

In early 1971 I bought a 1965 MGB roadster, color pale blue with blue top. I got it for \$100 from my neighbor. The first time I "saw" the car it was buried in a snow pile. After clearing a way in, and an opening for the tailpipe, it started right up. I really loved this car and learned to do pretty much all the repairs myself. As I had it through most of my college years I couldn't afford to pay somebody to fix it. I went all over with the B, summer and winter. With snow tires it would go anywhere, including up the notoriously steep Syracuse hills.

One night I came back from Montreal and hit a blizzard on Route 81. The only way I could tell I was on the road was by keeping it between the reflector markers. I could hear snow being compressed by the underbody for 40 miles.

Shortly before graduation I was broadsided by a drunk and the car was totaled. I sold the wreck to Sleazy at Access Auto and pocketed the insurance money. With that meager dough, plus graduation money and with a new job, I intended to buy a brand new '73 B. However I learned they cost \$5,500 at the time so I got a new Audi for just \$3,300."

Tony Makepeace

"My first car was a 1939 Model Standard Nine, four cylinder, side valve, two door saloon. Built by the Standard Motor Company in Coventry UK. Later known as the Standard Triumph Co. Having a car greatly improved my chances of getting a date. Most dates preferred riding in a car seat as opposed to the back of a motor cycle especially if they were wearing mini skirts.

I remember the first time I drove my car alone after getting my license, what a feeling of freedom. The car was in reasonable condition, considering it had survived the Blitz, some rust but not bad. Steering was something of a challenge as you could turn the steering wheel half a turn in either direction before it came into contact with the steering rack.

The car came with Bendix cable brakes. No matter how often you adjusted them they had a mind of their own. Press the brake pedal the car turned left or right, rarely pulling up straight. As for braking in reverse this only happened if you were going up hill. The window steamed up when it rained, there were the odd electrical (Lucas) problems, but at that time I thought this was normal.

I spent many evenings working on the car listening to the radio which was reporting on the early space flights from Cape Canaveral of Alan Shepard, John Glenn and others. Little did I know that a few years later I would make the USA my home and buy my first American car, a 1957 Pontiac Chieftain. But that's another story."

"My first car was a 1959 Corvette. Black on black with red leather interior and a white rag top and black hard top. It had a 283 engine, 3 speed,411 rear, and posatraction.

I sold the car in 1964 after receiving my letter to report for a physical for the USA army. I joined the Air Force and went to England. There I bought a 1966 MGB with overdrive and an after market hard top.

In 1968 I shipped it back to the states before being discharged and kept it until 1972 when it was hit behind the left front wheel that bent the frame. Then I bought a 1972 MGB that I garaged while I was living in Brooklyn The next year I moved to Rochester. Since it was the only car I owned I had to drive it for awhile until I could get a winter car. That was its demise. The under carriage rusted and rotted. I then put it in a barn where it remains. I now drive a 1970 MGB and still use the hard top from my first one."

"The instant I turned 16 in 1970, I ran down to the local Motor Vehicle Office to get my learner's permit. I had studied the book and passed the written test with flying aces. Over the next few weeks my mom took me out and taught me how to drive on what was our family car at the time, a green (BRG!!) 1967 Mercury



Cougar. I got the hang of it right away and, in a few weeks, signed up for my road test. Although I

was pretty nervous, I passed it with a flawless performance. My older brother and sister were out of the house by then and I soon became the family driver. I drove about 20 miles to high school and to where my dad worked and back again. This was in the foothills of the Adirondacks so I had to develop my snow and ice driving skills really fast. My high school friends all got rides in the Cougar; many times setting records for how many would fit in the car. Many of our best adventures had the Cougar in the center or at least as the transportation and it is hard to think of my high school years without the car coming to mind with a smile. Alas, the Cougar eventually met its demise

when it was banged up a few too many times, NEVER when driven by me, I might add! There's a nicely restored one that shows up frequently to the Rochester area cruise nights and I always wax nostalgic whenever I see it.

No article for Spokes from me on this subject would be complete without mentioning the first real sports car that I ever remember noticing and giving a thorough look-over. I was just a kid at the time, way before my Cougar days, when I was sitting in a small parking lot while my dad dashed into a store to pick up something or other. A few spaces over, carefully parked in a corner spot, was a blazingly shiny, brand new red sports car. I had no idea what a sports car even was, but I knew this vehicle was special and very intriguing. Where were the door handles? How did you get in the car? Very curious and very cool. The driver would have to be the coolest person ever! I can still picture the car in my head to this day and now know it was one of England's finest and fondest, the MGA. I didn't know then what a huge part the MG and all British sports cars would play in my life....but I'm sure glad they have.
