

# From SPOKES July 2002

Jim Ottman, winner of the Novice Class at the 1952 Grand Island Grant Prix, remembers the race during a conversation with Dick Powers.

**DP** Jim, when did you become interested in sports cars?

JO In 195 I, I had a troublesome '29 Ford convel1ible andc traded it for a new Renault CV4 convertible that was fun to drive and I could get 3 kids in it and 40 mpg. too. In January or February of '52, I traded the CV4 for the Singer. Drove it year round. Never put a heater in, so you had to dress warmly during the winter.

**DP** What did you have to do to go racing?

JO Living in Kenmore, NY, I joined the Western NY Chapter of the Sports Car Club of America and that included Rochester as well as Buffalo. You had to have a simple physical, apply to the competition Board and be approved to go racing. At your first race, you had to be *observed* and the Grand Island GP was my first race. That's why I was in the "novice", under 1500cc, class.

**DP** Did you modify the car and was there much safety equipment?

JO I did take the muffler off, tape the lights and put numbers on with tape too. No safety equipment like a roll bar or fuel cell. I did take the back seat out so it wouldn't fly away during the race and on the Singer you could lower the windshield, which I did and put a small piece of curved plexiglass in front of me to keep the bugs out of my teeth. Got Air Force surplus seat belts for \$5.00 and put them in.

As far as the driver is concerned, I borrowed a helmet with leather ear flaps. No Driver's suit, I wore regular pants with a golf shirt. The only problem with the golf shirt was that during the race the collar was flapping in the breeze and kept hitting me in the face!

**DP** George Herschell told me that there were 27 MG T series entered that weekend. I count 14 MG's in

your Novice Race, 6 TD's, including 2 MK II's and 8 Tcs including one with a Ford v-8 60 flat head. That one wasn't in your class. What are your memories of the race?

**JO** Passing all those MG's! I wasn't sure I could pass all of them. I must have been gridded back in the pack, because it took me a few laps to catch and pass all of them.

I remember coming down Whithaven Rd. Flying past Start/Finish and the pits and looking like a real hero. As I was taking Turn One on to East River Rd.. a *Jag 120* suddenly appeared. He had spun out and I didn't see him till I started my turn in. I had put Dunlop motorcycle tiers on the Singer and they really dug in and I was able to avoid the Jag.

Grand Island was a nice course for the Singer because of the long straights, Brakes had time to cool before the next corner and you had time to check gauges too. I think my fastest speed was 75 or 80 mph.

**DP** Did anything happen to the Singer during the race?

JO Well, not any real mechanical failures, but when I checked things after the race, I found the rear axle had shifted to the right. The right rear wheel was nearly aligned with the edge of the fender and the left side had about I.5" clearance. After the race the Singer went down the road a little sideways.

**DP** Any last thoughts?

**JO** We were all sitting on the lawn after the race. I didn't know I had won my class in the Novice race and when I went up to get my trophy. a 120 driver, Bill Pierce, said he never saw a Singer win anything.

**DP** That's because he never saw you drive a Singer before. Jim, Thanks for sharing those wonderful memories with us.

# AT WATKINS GLEN

# Learn about Central NY Raceway Park, Northeast's newest motorsports track

Talk set for 11 a.m. June 18

WATKINS GLEN, N.Y. (June 1, 2016) - Central New York Raceway Park, slated to be the Northeast's newest race track, is in the spotlight for the June 18 Center Conversations talk at the International Motor Racing Research Center.

Founders and developers of the state-of-the-art and multi-faceted racing facility north of Syracuse will speak at 11 a.m. at the Racing Research Center at 610 S. Decatur St., Watkins Glen. The Center staff notes that the starting time of the talk is earlier than the usual monthly time.

The Watkins Glen Area Chamber of Commerce is a sponsor of the talk, which is free and open to all.

On the panel of speakers will be Glenn Donnelly, Raceway Park president and CEO, owner and operator of DIRT Motorsports until its sale in 2004; John Lehman, Raceway Park vice president; Jerry Henderberg, Raceway Park general manager; and Peter Argetsinger, track designer, racing coach and racer.

"It is exciting to be able to hear the plans from those most intimately involved in this newest race venture in upstate New York," Racing Research Center Executive Director Tom Weidemann said.

Plans for the \$50 million, year-round Central New York Raceway Park, CNYRP, are extensive. The 150-acre facility is slated to include a 5/8-mile synthetic dirt oval, a 2.2-mile road course, theater-style stadium seating for 4,980 spectators, a 50-bay NASCAR-style garage, a 350-seat, full-service restaurant, a 275-seat banquet room, VIP suites, observatio

full-service restaurant, a 275-seat banquet room, VIP suites, observation deck and a full television and radio production studio.

CNYRP's dirt track construction is scheduled for completion in mid-summer. The EDF Energy Road Course, sponsored by Houston-based EDF Energy Services, the world's biggest electricity generator, is set for a spring 2017 opening.

Round 12 of American Motorcycle Association Pro Flat Track is confirmed for CNYRP on Aug. 20.

And, last September, Gov. Andrew Cuomo announced that CNYRP would be the new home for Super DIRT Week, which last October ended a 44-year run at the Syracuse Mile on the New York State Fairgrounds in Syracuse. NAPA Super DIRT Week at CNYRP is scheduled for Oct. 5-9.

The International Motor Racing Research Center is an archival and

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# **Bury Me in and Old MOWOG Parts Box**

Here is a reprint from June 2005 because we are getting cars out, I though it would be a good read.

The car is dirty; it needs to be washed. So what does this entail? To most folks it would be a trip the local car wash where you would hand the attendant a certain number of dollars and you drive through a man made rainstorm with brushes, towels and possibly someone at the end to wipe down the windows. Occasionally you might even find someone with a vacuum to do the inside of the car as you arrive. I have even seen some people empty their ashtrays on the floor before this maneuver. (Totally gross!) You drive out and drive home. To many people this is a clean car but to me it is stirring up the dirt. I could probably count on one hand the number of times I have used a commercial car wash and without a doubt can tell you that I have always been sorry. I will never use one again.

First of all commercial car washes do not get your car clean. After going through a commercial car wash open the car doors and look at the door jams or check the windows on the inside. I'll bet they haven't ever been wiped down by one of the attendants. Open the trunk and see if the inside of the trunk has been vacuumed and the edges wiped down. Try the hood and see if the edges have been cleaned and the engine detailed. More often than not you will find on the average guys car an accumulation of leaves, dirt and other debris under the hood and clogged tightly around the base of the windscreen wipers or air vents. These are the people that usually have overheating or cooling problems with their vehicle. This is not clean, in fact all car washes do in my opinion is make a car look good from about twenty-five feet. Any closer you begin to see areas where these mechanical marvels have made a mess of things.

Several years ago when I was taking the Metro Bus to work on a regular basis a series of new busses were introduced with Plexiglas windows. After about three or four months the windows turned frosted and you couldn't see a thing out of them. If you studied the window for a few minutes you could spot areas in corners and such where the car wash brushes missed and the Plexiglas was still clear. This proved to me abrasive power of these contraptions and I never used one again. Look at a vehicle that has been run

through contraptions like this on a regular basis and you can spot areas where the paint has been totally rub off.

To say the least this is not what I would pay for at a car wash.

Call me old fashioned or whatever I just never use commercial car washes. Give me a hose, a pail of warm soapy car wash soap, a washing mitt or sponge, towel or chamois and let me to it myself. Besides I do a better job at less than half the cost.

First thing I do is vacuum the car front to back. This includes the trunk if I have been using it to transport something like plants, lumber, potting soil or whatever. I then rinse the car well with plain water and only then do I apply a good coating of a commercial car wash soap of some kind. I usually do the car in stages and rinse well between each. Then the car is wiped down with a towel or chamois including the windows on both sides. While doing windows I also do the door jams on both the door and body. This is so often overlooked at the "Car Wash" and is so obvious when not done. After this I open the trunk and wipe down the edges of the lid and opening. I usually spend a few minutes throwing out any trash accumulated over the last week or so. The engine compartment is next and I do the same here doing the edges of the hood and around the engine bay. I keep a close lookout for collections of leaves or other debris in the air vents or other places under the hood. Another good place to look is the inner fenders just in front of the doors. These can be great collection areas for leaves, dirt and tree seeds. I also check the oil, radiator, gearbox etc at this time. Every few times I use a bit of Armor All to clean up the plastic and rubber parts. A clean engine room is a lot easier to spot a leak in or diagnose other problems.

About once a year I give the vehicle a coat of wax and detail the interior vinyl seats, floor mats and anything else that needs attention. Your car is now clean and presentable. You'll feel better too because you did it yourself and probably saved a few bucks, besides its fun!



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
