Vice Chairman's Notes

I have been zooming about in the MGB and just got back from taking a photo for the MG Club photo challenge. I got back and started looking at some of my MG books. If you are like me, you probably have a whole library of MG books. I have had books on MGs even before I owned an MG. Books can be a valuable reference on how things are supposed to be on your MG "from the factory." Or you can just look wistfully at the beautiful pre-war and post war MGs that have come along over the years. Here is a list of some of my favorite MG books and publications.

MGB 1969-1972 Autobook, Workshop manual for the MGB and MGB GT 1969-1972. By Kenneth Ball, Autopress, copyright 1970, fourth edition 1972. I bought this book as a workshop manual back in 1976 when I purchased my 1971 MGB. The many grease-stained pages tell a story of all the various adventures I have had in the garage and alongside the road fixing that MGB as well as our current 1973 MGB. There's little difference between a '72 MGB and '73 so I kept the book after selling our '71 MGB and it's been a constant companion and lifesaver many times over.

Original MGB with MGC and MGB GTV8, The restorers guide to all roadsters and GT models 1962-80. By Anders Ditlev Clausager, Herridge & Sons copyright 1994, 2012 edition. This is the "bible" for MGB restoration and people quote it like it's the gospel. I have heard people say online "According to Clausager page 68 paragraph three..." Well, you get the picture. Facts, figures



and lots of photos document everything. It's a must have to get the little details right.

Step by Step MGB Including MGC, V8 and RV8 Service Guide, and owner's manual. All models from first to last. By Lindsay Porter, Porter publishing copyright 1994, 1994 edition. This is another workshop manual and it's not as in depth as the Autopress manual so it doesn't cover everything but has loads of photos and walks you through most every typical maintenance job you will need to do at specified mileage intervals, 500, 10,000, 36,000 from brakes to tires and air cleaners, whatever might need routine maintenance. Our MG has over 136,000 miles and I still occasionally refer to it although it's not all greasy and battle worn like the Autopress book. It is still a good reference especially if you were a first time MGB owner.

Those were the days...Don Hayter's MGB Story-The birth of the MGB in MG's Abingdon Design & Development Office. By Don Hayter Veloce publishing 2012. This book is full of wonderful anecdotes and stories about the birth and development of the MGB by the man that designed it, Don Hayter. What a great book this is! All the more poignant with the recent passing of Don Hayter last month. Lots of photos and inside information from the glory days at MG.

MG The book of the car. By Anders Ditlev Clausager Galley Press, copyright 1982. This is another book by Clausager and its more of a large format coffee table book heavy on the glossy full color photos. It devotes two or three pages to each model from Bullnose Morris to the MGB GT V8. Light on copy but beautiful photography. I especially enjoy the section on one-off design cars, for example the EX 234 which was supposed to replace both the MGB and Midget but never made it to production.

The Classic MG. By Richard Aspden, Bison Books copyright 1983. This is another large format coffee table book and has lots of photos both in black and white and in color. This book takes a chronological look at the history of MG from Old Number 1 through to the last Midget off the line and the closure of MG. More information than the Clausager coffee table book and with hundreds of photos this is a great book for beautiful photographs as well as valuable information on the MG marque's history. A good history but pardon the fact they list "old number one" as the first MG when we all know about the various Morris specials that were contemporaries.

The MGA, MGB and MGC - A collector's guide. By Graham Robson, Motor Racing publications copyright 1978, reprinted 1999. This book is fantastic for reference as it has loads of photographs and technical details on each of the models covered MGA, MGB, MGBGT and MGC. All kinds of data abound as well as racing photos, model changes and appendices listing numbers of cars produced by year and model, weights and capacities, top speeds and economy for every model. It packs a lot into a relatively small size.

MG by McComb. By F. Wilson McComb, Motorbooks copyright 1978, 2004 edition. This book by Wilson McComb covers every MG from Morris before there was an MG through to the Metro and MGF. Lavishly illustrated and with loads of history, stories and even technical specifications and data in the appendices. McComb knows MG through and through and I seem to recall he once visited our club for one of our past anniversary dinners or car shows. I may have that wrong but some of the long-time club members can correct or affirm that. A great book to add to your library and at 376 pages lots of information. This is a great book if you could only have one book on MGs.

Great Marques MG. By Chris Harvey and Charles Blunsden, Octopus Books, copyright 1983. Another large format coffee table book with gorgeous full color and full-page photos on almost every page. This book takes a more distant look at MG from the outside, without as many of the inside anecdotes that the others may contain, but it is great at summarizing in each chapter a different phase of MG at that time. From the inception of MG through the prewar years, during the war and post war boom phase, right up to the end of MG at Abingdon. I like this book because it so neatly captures and imparts the mood and times of each phase of the company history through a mix of content and photos.

What about you? What are your favorite MG books? Looking forward to discussions with you over a pint at our next club get together!

We wish the car the same tribute used so many times as a heartfelt farewell to many British car enthusiast friends – Safety Fast, old friend, smooth roads ahead.

Passing The Torch

Gil has always been interested in cars, especially in sports cars. He always went down to Watkins Glen for the Sports Car Races every year. He got me interested in the races too. When we went down in 1953 we saw this brand new dark green 1953 MGTD. Oh, how we wished we could buy one. No, too expensive and we were too practical to own such a car. We never got over the desire to be owners some day. One Sunday in the paper was this MGTD advertised for sale. I said "lets go look at it!" well I didn't have to suggest it twice to Gil. So off we went to see what we could see. This MG was red, in pretty good shape, ran good, we took it out for a ride, it kept calling our names "Betty and Gil, buy me"—well, we left there saying that we'd buy it. Boy were we ever giddy! We picked it up a couple days later, the neighbor lady yelled out the door "I thought you were too practical." Well guess what, her husband bought an MGTD about six months later. You've heard the expression "keeping up with the neighbors"? We kept this car for about a year and then bought one that was under restoration which ours badly needed. Gil finished it and now we had a perfect MG to enjoy and drive. We joined the local MG Car Club and became charter members as the club was just forming. Through the years there were lots of car activities to participate in our local area and soon we were traveling out of town and even out of state for more activities. We have had this same MGTD for fifty years summer of 2007. We're still very active in the MG Car Club.

Through the years we have met some wonderful people both here in this country and people in England that were connected to the parent MG club of England and to the MG factory in Abingdon, England. We later got to visit the factory and watch the MG's being made. Our boys, Gary and Jeffrey got so they enjoyed the MG as much as we did. When the boys were still small enough to fit in small spaces we used to play tricks on Daddy. Whenever we were in the vicinity of Rochester Products at quitting time we would go into the parking lot and find the MG. It was our second car and if I needed the car for any reason Gil would drive the MG to work. We'd listen for the quitting bell and I'd quick hide the boys under the tonneau cover, tell them to squat down on their knees and be quiet because I could see Gil coming. When he unzipped the tonneau cover the boys would scare Daddy! Then they would ride home in the TD with the top down; they just loved that. We bought a small camping trailer that slept four that we could haul behind the MG. Quite often we would go to a campground within a fifty-mile radius of Rochester Products, Gil would set us up there for a week or two-the boys, the dog and me, while he drove back and forth to work every day. Gil loved that! When the boys got older Gil and the boys would drive the MG to boy scout camp. On the back roads Gil would let the boys drive the MG to camp, they both learned to drive on the MG.

When Jeff was a junior in high school, he bought an MGA roadster that was in pretty bad shape. During that year Gil and Jeff restored it to perfection. Jeff was able to drive it to his high school graduation. Jeff showed his car at many car shows that summer and often won trophies. He was so proud of that car, it was his pride and joy! Gary wasn't into buying sports cars yet, he did own several cars shortly after he graduated from high school. When Jeff went off to college in Salem, West Virginia he bought another MG. He had his MGA at college but when he saw this 1969 MGC was for sale he couldn't resist buying it. He did repair work on the C in the parking lot at college. Jeff owned it first then Gary and soon after Gary and Paula were married, they bought a brand new 1975 MG Midget. They enjoyed it for several years. Our three MGs, our TD, Jeff and Jan's MGA and Gary and Paula's Midget enjoyed a threesome at a few of the MG car club activities. The boys learned how to repair their cars and keep them on the road. As their children came along it was obvious that their MGs weren't practical to keep. In 1976 we bought a rare 1939 MGTA Tickford. Gil started to restore it and then we moved to Alabama. It went on hold for several years, finally finishing it in 1982 and started showing it around the south. It took a Junior then a Senior at the Hershey AACA Fall meet. It also received many 1st place trophies at the MG Car Club's events that we belonged to down south.

We finally sold it in 1989. We decided that keeping just two MGs on the road was enough to keep us busy. Gary and Jeff didn't lose the MG bug completely. Jeff has acquired another MGA, a 1955 MG that he is busy restoring from the ground up. We hope in another year we will see it on the road. Also, at the same time Gary in Alabama has bought a 1952 TD. He too is busy restoring it from the ground up. Tools are busy being sent from one garage to another. While restoring his TD he bought a 1972 MGB to drive, It looks like our MGC, they are both red. Gil has worked on both of their cars. We hope Gary's TD will be on the road in another year. We'd like to get all our MGs on the road and go to an MG event somewhere between Rochester and Georgia where Gary and Paula are moving. Our two grandsons Chris and Nick have attended MCC here in Rochester taking the Automotive Technology Program. They work on their own cars learning from their father Jeff. Maybe someday they'll get the MG bug. Our grandson in Alabama is also very mechanically minded learning from his father Gary. Eric has owned a beautiful 1967 yellow Mustang ever since he left high school. Grandpa Gil didn't realize that learning how to keep our TD on the road for 50 years he inspired our two boys and three grandsons the pleasure of owning and being able to repair and enjoy their own cars and the satisfaction that the torch was "passed on" for three generations. Possibly you know this, but the MGCC UK was founded in 1930 by the late John Thornley. That made the **MG Car Club 90 years old in 2020**. Due to the pandemic, not much celebrating went on, but like our WNY MG Centre, 2021 will start to make up for it.

There will be a major weekend car event in the UK, but it will have a different twist from the usual MG event. This year, it will

be held in conjunction with the TR Register and Triumph Sports Six club. They call it the **Triumph & MG Weekend** and will be August 13-15. The TR connection was a surprise, but a second surprise is that it will be in Malvern, the home of Morgan and they will have tours of the Morgan Works. A number in our club have been to the Morgan factory and if you are in the UK, try to fit that tour in as you will see Morgans still being hand crafted by the latest generation of families who have worked there for over 100 years.

Shifting gears to 2021, it looks like MG will be building a new sports car, the **Cyberster EV**. Well, that's what they are calling it now. MGs are still being made by their Chinese parent company SAIC and sold in many countries. The MG SZ (SUV type vehicle) was just voted Best Value in the UK, so they are making some good cars. The SAIC design center is in London and the Cyberster started out as a concept car displayed at the April 2021 Shanghai motor show. At that time, they said that if 5000 people showed interest in the car and deposited £111 (about \$160) by the end of July, they would consider building something like the Cyberster. According to the latest information I received from the MGCC UK, they reached this goal already and will be producing a **new "EV" MG sports car** that will have a **500 mile range** and do **0-62 in less than 3 seconds**!

We may never see this car in the US or Canada, but you never know. I'll let you know when I hear more from our Home Club. Safety Fast!

They keep me busy. It was in April 2021 while



2021 MGCC WNY Motoring Challenge

Throughout the 2021 driving season, we are continuing to run our new Motoring Challenge for all members, and it's easy to jump in and have some motoring fun that will last through the driving season. We started in March, but it's not too late to jump in. We'll wrap it up around the end of October and announce the winners and prizes shortly thereafter. (Not a MGCC member? See elsewhere in Spokes or on the website regarding how to become a member – it's quick, easy, inexpensive, and you need not own an MG to join.)

To participate in the Motoring Challenge, simply:

Find the list of destinations elsewhere in *Spokes*.

- > Drive to one or more of the listed destinations.
- Snap a picture of your car there, preferably with yourself or your teammate in the photo. (We need AT LEAST ONE photo that includes a good likeness of you. Let's get to know each other, eh?)
- Send the photo(s) by email to challenge@mgcarclub.com.
- Enjoy the monthly updates in *Spokes*, where you'll see yours and other competitors' photos, and get updates on scoring along with the challenges for the new month.

You'll score 1 or more points for each destination. Points may vary, based on the difficulty or the creativity required. Additionally, <u>early-bird bonus points</u> may be given occasionally for photos received before a certain date, so pay attention monthly to get the most points possible. (Late photos won't get the early-bird bonus, but they aren't worthless, just worth a bit less!) Rather than filling out a form or marking a checklist, each month, one or more destinations will be listed in *Spokes*, and each will be identified with a destination number. When you submit your photos, be sure to include the corresponding destination number for each. Remember, each photo must:

- show your car
- show the destination (and/or other requirement) clearly

Though not always REQUIRED we'd like it if you include yourself in each photo)

Some of you might have more than one special car you'd like to use in the Motoring Challenge. This is permitted, but we strongly encourage participation using only your special car(s). The point is to encourage driving and having fun with these special cars; it is NOT our intention to award points for driving around in your daily-driver 2019 RAV4 or your 2017 Honda Accord or your 2013 Ford Focus.

HOW TO ENTER: No forms to fill out, just email us your first photo(s)! We need:


- 1 Your name(s)

Pop's TD

After WWII 'Pop' (Charles Elam, formerly a carburetor engineer with Rochester Products) was a young man watching vets driving around in these really cool little British sports cars. From that point on he always wanted a T-Series MG. About 20 years ago he found one in PA with enough right with it to run and enough wrong with it to keep him busy.

From that point on the TD was commonly known as *His Mistress*. Instead of just cleaning it up and calling it good, it 'needed' a 12-volt system. Then it was the fuel system; that really did the trick. Those were nice, but, boy wouldn't a new paint-job be great! Not to do anything halfway, all the sheet metal came off and each piece was painted individually. By the time he was done, it was a complete off-frame restoration with all the chrome being sent to Buffalo for refinishing. Every part was labeled with a tag and the smaller pieces placed in zip-lock bags. (While detailing the MG we found one of the tags and left it under the dash for posterity.)

Pop died in December of 2018 and since then we've been downsizing his estate. My sister and I had planned on keeping the TD, but recently came to the conclusion to sell the car as she needed someone to love and pamper her. May the next owner enjoy this beautiful machine as much as Pop did! It will turn heads wherever you go.
