



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A candidate for the biggest "rip off" of the year is the United States Grand Prix at Watkins Glen. I've attended races from St. Jovite to Daytona and from Indianapolis to Spa and of all the racing facilities I've visited Watkins Glen is absolutely the worst spectator track I've been to. I will admit the new section recently added is definitely a spectator improvement, however the price one pays for the priviledge of attending a Glen race is outragious. A general admission ticket for the GP weekend was \$18.00 per person. This entitles the bearer to admittance to the grounds - nothing else. Campers are now herded into separate areas and charged a buck per head each night. Using the limited camping facilities which are available would make you sick due to the filth and trash which surrounds them. There is a family camping area which is more expensive but assures you segregation from the drug freaks common to the normal camping area. Remember when race programs were \$1.00? Remember when race programs were \$1.50? A race program now commands \$2.00 and they are hardly worth it. These programs contain virtually the same information from race to race track map, list of officials, sponsors, and general advertisements.

The best spectator areas are occupied by huge grandstands. Naturally there is a price for seating in these stands - \$5.00 per person in addition to general admission. When the new pit area was constructed the GP Association had the foresight to build grandstands above the pit stalls. From this vantage point it is impossible to see cars in the pits unless you happen to be in one of the first two rows. These seats also have a price in the neighborhood of \$25.00 per person for the weekend. Naturally the stands are never fully occupied.

Several years ago the Kendal Oil Company provided the funds necessary to build a large garage and tech center. The competition cars were housed in the tech center overnight providing crews with a good place to work on their cars. The GP Association decided more revenue could be produced by allowing spectators to walk thru the garage @10¢ per person to get a close look at the cars. An aisle was roped off and soon there were long lines of spectators awaiting their turn. This was a good bargain while it lasted. When the new track section was added a new scoring tower, pits and Kendall tech center were constructed. The cost of the new tech center was reported to be \$200,000. a rather heavy sum. The new center was obviously designed with expected revenues from walk thru spectators. Cost of a round trip tour was increased to 25¢ per head. The following year the cost rose to 50¢ and now its \$1.00. This is indeed moneygrabbing.

The really informed spectator cannot miss the "Inside Track Seminar". This was begun several years ago by a promoter who had a new idea on

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how to squeeze more money out of the spectator. The seminar is basically a question and answer session with the fringe benefits of a buffet and unlimited tech center pass. It enables the few who attend to possibly rub elbows with a famous race driver. The price for this is a stiff - \$55.00 per person.

This was the USGP in 1973. The only consolation was that we did see a good race!

There is a good possibility that there will be a Grand Prix Formula I race held


in Switzerland next year.

EDITOR'S ABERRATIONS

FROM
DAVE WILD

HEY, do you sometimes get the feeling that we, Mr. & Mrs. John Q. Public, are being manipulated like pawns in some gigantic chess game? One day we are told that 7% of the crude oil the United States uses come from Saudi Arabia. Later, as publicity builds up concerning the energy crisis we are told the figure is 23% and just recently we hear that it is almost 1/3 of all the oil. Cabinet Secretary Rogers Morton, the Chairman of Sinclair Refineries, Ralph Nader and a prominent conservationist were involved in a TV panel discussion on the subject. The Sinclair representative "couldn't say exactly how many barrells of oil they process" nor apparently could he give an estimate! Sec. Morton turned every question around and was very noncomittal. Nader and the conservationist made them look foolish. -Now, Ralph Nader has a rather large "credibility gap" ever since his ill-informed corvair attack but even his gap is small compared to the Government's gap at this moment. There is an energy crisis, but to what degree? It seems awfully convenient for the publicity buildup on the crisis to come about at this time. It certainly effected approval of the Alaskan pipeline in a hurry. It relieves pressure on the limitation of off-shore oil drilling. The Environmental Protection Agency had backed itself into a corner on vehicle emissions standards the pressure on which is now somewhat eased. Publicity on the Watergate mess eased up (at least temporarily) and the threat of fuel rationing allowed considerable increase in the cost of gas at the pump. All that certainly is one heck of a coincidence and if the President can "miraculously" avoid gas rationing he is going to come out of this "smelling like a rose".

Maybe I'm too cynical but sometimes I wonder if we will ever get the facts. In talking to numerous acquaintances (non-car enthusiasts) they are almost unanimous in selecting motor sports as the first thing to abolish during a fuel shortage (it is the most visible form of non-essential gas consumption). They seem astounded to find that motor racing is rated sixth or seventh in the list of recreational energy consumers trailing the leading consumer, horse racing! major consumers include football, vacation travel and several other activities that lead motor racing in energy consumption. Naturally we can't eliminate horse racing because that would hit organized crime right where it lives! Seriously, if any sport is to be cut back then in order to be completely fair all forms of repreation should be cut. If the energy "crunch" is that serious I'm confident that motor sport enthusiasts would do their part to solve the problem. The present fuel situation does have a good side in that it is forcing the public to consider more practical automobiles. Some may be introduced for the first time to cars superior to their former road monsters and (dare we hope?) even learn to DRIVE again!

The Wagonjack Sports Car Meet held in October was a success befitting the fifth anniversary of this informal gathering of car enthusiasts. We would like to thank all of you for helping make this event what it is. Many thanks go to British Leyland Motors for supplying the trophies for the classes in which their products are eligible to compete. I hope all the participants had a good time and will return to be with us for the sixth annual meet in 1974. Thirty-seven cars were registered and with the late arrival of at least four more unregistered cars we had a total of over 40 vehicles on display. The cars ranged from a BMW Isetta to no less than three on display. The cars ranged from a BMW Isetta to no less than three Ferraris and a C-Type Jaguar! This fifth anniversary event was also marked by the fact that Gil and Jeff Langswager and I finally found the few hours necessary to get our rear-engined Mercedes-Benz running. Yes, it's alive and running very well! The meet was also financially successfull although that is not one of the objectives of this event. We also have sufficient hot dogs left over for perhaps a spring picnic(?).

As the Sports Car Festival, our major effort, expands it becomes less necessary for the Wagonjack Meet to do other than meet expenses. As the dollar factor lessens it frees us to change aspects of the meet. Should we make it even less formal? Should we de-emphasize the trophies and provide every entrant with something really "special" instead of a dash placque? Should we not sell hot dogs but supply the picnic facilities, free cider and coffee? Should we expand the trophy structure? Should we add a "trials" event at the same time or keep it quiet and peaceful and hold the "trials" event at another time? Let your club officers/directors know what direction you would like to see the event take.
