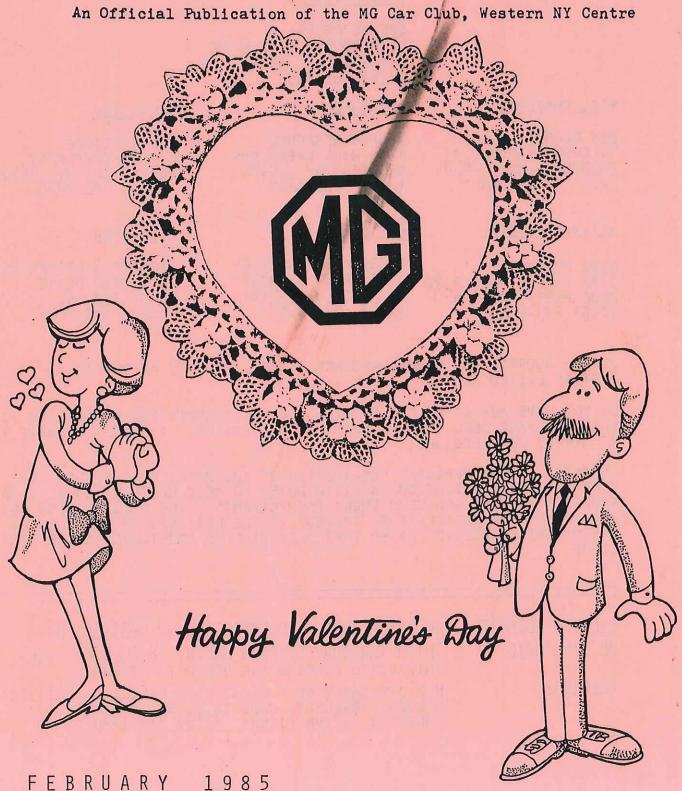

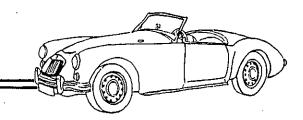

EDITOR'S NOTES

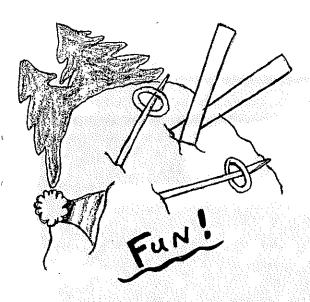

the snow piling up on the ever greens, and how quiet and bright it seems at night. I bet you can tell this is written by someone who drives a front wheel drive car every day!

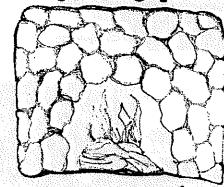

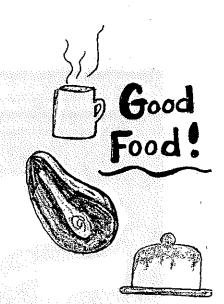

PROTOTYPE OF THE EX.234 By George Heissenberger

This is the second in a series of articles on potential MG models that, for one reason or another, never made it to production.

This is the story of EX.234 which would have been the MGD. This car went through every phase of design, rough sketches, analysis, clay models and evolved into this pre-production prototype. All that was needed to begin tooling and production was the nod from BMC in 1968. Unfortunately, the "Bullet" project (TR7) was given the go-ahead and the less expensive, already debugged, ready to produce EX.234 was axed.

Faced with a tight budget and increasing costs in meeting U.S. Federal Regulations along with high re-tooling costs, the EX.234 was designed to replace both the MGB and the Midget.

The EX.234 was designed and styled by Pinin Farina as in the previous ADO 34 (see January Spokes). Concieved as a 2+2 roadster, it would accept the B's 1798cc engine to become the "MGD" and the Midget's 1275cc A-series engine to become the Midget MK IV. Each model would have different trim and styling add-ons to differentiate the "D" from the Midget MK IV.

With a wheelbase of 87" (compared to the MGB's 91" wheelbase and the Midget's 80") it fit right between the two models, while providing more passenger space, more luggage space and a rudimentary rear seat.

Equipped with all wheel-independent suspension using BMC's Hydro-lastic set up, the EX.234 would accept a manual or automatic transmission and there was even talk of using the DOHC engine from BMC's Austin group.

The MGD and Midget MK IV would have been in the showrooms for the 1970 model year.

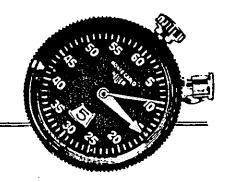
Ever since Standard-Triumph became part of Leyland, MG had been put on a back burner. This was to be no exception. Even though the EX.234 was ready for production, the BMC management decided to commence studies for a totally different car... the "Bullet" (TR 7) that would eventually cost more to produce, more to design, more to develop and be a much less well received car than the MGD would have been. Add to this the abysmal maintenance record of the TR7 and the decision of BMC can be seen in its fatal light.

April 12-13 MG T Register weekend in Rochester.

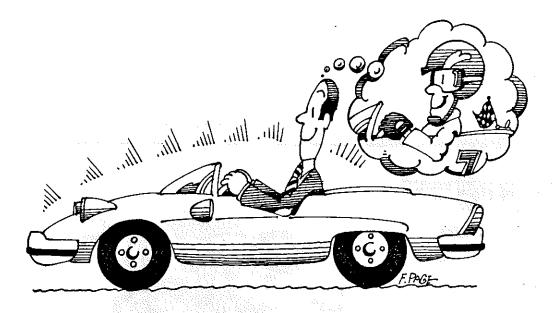

☐ I feel silly driving 75 mph uphill on a deserted road at 6 a.m. and then slowing down to 55 after I pass the crest and head downhill into Radar Trap Terrain,

□ I am frustrated when I discover that I can make better time if, instead of starting out on a long trip before dawn when the expressways are empty, I wait until they are jammed. When they are empty, the danger of arrest is high. But when everyone is scoffing the law, arrest is nearly impossible.

□ I am still angry at the Department of Transportation for enacting the 55-mph limit in 1973 and blaming it on the Arab oil embargo. Now that the Arabs have oil coming out of their ears, the reason has vanished but the law lingers on.

☐ It is my contention that when you design superhighways for speeds of 70 mph and up, then establish a speed limit of 55, what you have done is construct a coast-to-coast speed trap with our tax money.

The worst was when I accidentally slammed a car door on my son's hand at 00 mph. That was horrible!

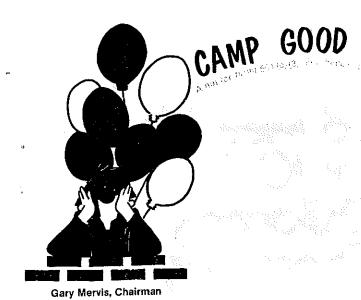

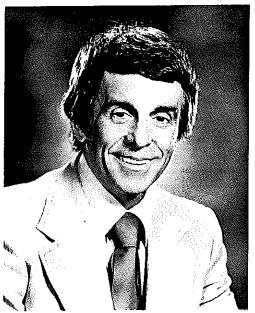
